2018/2019 Selectmen Report

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to report continued progress on town improvements for the benefit of the citizens of Windsor.

The new backhoe has arrived and been placed into service.

We plan to continue our efforts to upgrade and improve our roads. We have reached above the 90% level of completion of road work in the last 10 years. We now hope to work on a maintenance schedule that will keep them in good condition for some years to come.

Our Budget process this year has been completed and as always, we are awaiting the final version of the States' budget process. The prospect is for good news this year.

As always, we welcome visitors to our regularly scheduled meetings every other Tuesday night beginning at 6 pm. The schedule is posted on our web site (www.windsor.maine.gov) and on the new electronic sign in front of the Town Office. You can also check the web site for "The Town Hub" which we use to communicate important and/or special events.

Regarding special events, the Town is supporting the efforts to build a Veterans Memorial at the site of the current flag pole. To support this effort a number of events have been held to raise money as well as donations from the Town. One effort that is currently underway is to sell paver blocks engraved with the names of the people or the organizations that are willing to donate to this effort. We encourage you and/or your business to come to the Town Office to speak with the Town Manager for further information.

The Board of Selectmen want to thank all of those who take the time and effort to be involved in all the various Town activities that are needed to keep us going. We appreciate all of your time and contributions to help make Windsor a great place to live!

Town Manager's Report

It has been a pleasure working for the residents of the Town of Windsor and the Board of Selectmen over the last 14 years. I take pride in living in our Town and what we all have accomplished in making this Town a wonderful community and great place to live. The Town of Windsor's Financial Condition is in good standing. In the 2019-2020 budget we are proposing a decrease in the Town's side of the budget of an estimated amount of (\$27,017.00) and have an increase in additional Revenues of \$47,000.00. The Windsor School's proposed budget has an increase in the Windsor's Share of an estimated figure of \$139,067.66 and the County Budget has an estimated increase of \$14,550.00. With the proposed increase in the Town's Valuation we are hoping to be able to maintain or lower the current mil rate even with the additional increased in the School and County.

The employees of the Town of Windsor strive to do the best job they can whether it is working in the Town Office, or on our Town Roads for the Public Works Department or at the Transfer Station with our Recycling and Municipal Solid Waste.

The Office Staff (Kelly McGlothlin, Debbie French, Kyoko Roderick and Ty Turner) works very hard to help in the most efficient and friendliest way possible to take care of all your needs. They are required to keep up with the most recent State of Maine rules and regulations and are very dedicated to the Town of Windsor. I would like to thank them for everything they do. Please let us know if you have any questions, comments or concerns.

It has taken us some time and dedication to get the Town of Windsor's roads up to good standards. Over the past eleven years we have worked very hard on getting our 32.9 miles of roads onto a 7 – 10-year cycle. We have taken care of the worst roads of over 21 miles (66.55%) by grinding them and reestablishing the base and center line. We have done 24 miles (73.34%) of Overlay and 16 miles (49.74%) of Shim and Overlay. We are now able to maintain our roads on a regular basis. We have replaced many cross culverts throughout the Town and have replaced them with plastic culverts. The Public Works Department works very diligently on keeping these roads safe to travel in the winter and work on ditching and replacing driveway culverts in the summer. I would like to thank Keith Hall, Timothy Coston, James Page, McGee Construction and Part-Time drivers for their many hours spent on keeping the roads safe to travel in the winter.

I would like to thank the Transfer Station employees (Timothy Coston, Moe Fish, David Coons, Norman Black and Austin Roderick) for their help and dedication to the Town of Windsor residents. We will be having a Transfer Station Committee Meeting this summer to discuss the future of the Town of Windsor's Transfer Station and welcome anyone who would like to attend. We will be posting the information on the marquee out front of the Town Hall and on our webpage at www.windsor.maine.gov.

SAFETY COMES FIRST!!

PLEASE be considerate when driving by any Work Zones and SLOW DOWN for flaggers and workers within the Work Zone Areas. Also, during winter hours, please SLOW DOWN and pull over when approaching a Plow Truck so they can maintain and plow safely in and around mail boxes for the safety of everyone. THANK YOU.

In the past year we have done some Major Road Construction on the following roads per Town approval;

1. Maxcys Mills Road – 1.06 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
2. Coopers Mills Road – 1.15 miles of ¾" Shim
3. Coopers Mills Road – 1.53 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
4. Piper Road – .09 miles of Reclaim with 2" Base
5. Greeley Road – 1.16 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
6. Pinkham Road – .5 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
7. Weeks Mills Road – 1.32 miles of ¾" Shim
8. Weeks Mills Road – 1.32 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
9. Wingood Road – .58 miles in from Route 105 with a 2" Base

In the 2019/2020 budget we are looking to work on the following roads; Piper Road, Wingood Road, Coopers Mills Road, Windsor Neck Road and Reed Road. We also have planned to do additional shoulder work, ditching, brush cutting and replacing some culverts.

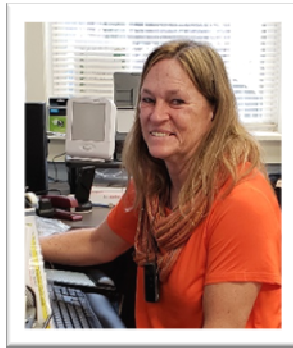

The change in the temperature this winter made the roads very rough until the frost came out of the ground. We found areas where we never had frost heave problems before. Keith said he would like to thank Tim, Jim and Brian for the long winter hours during the storms and the help in the repairs needed on the trucks after the storms. There was not much time to work on the trucks because of storms every other day.

Town Clerk's Report

Residents of Windsor,

It has been an interesting and educational year as a new Town Clerk. I am pleased to serve the residents and greater communities of Windsor. I appreciate the support and cooperation with our Town Manager, Select Board, fellow colleagues, departments, board and committee members, and election personnel.

One of the responsibilities of the municipal clerk's office is the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from September 1995, death records beginning in 2011, and marriage records beginning January 1, 2017 are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License.....	\$40.00
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....	\$15.00
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....	\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the Clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course in order to purchase a Hunting license. Boats can now be registered on-line.

There were 603 dogs registered and 1 kennel license issued in 2018. Dogs 6 months or older that reside in Windsor for longer than 10 days

must be registered annually by December 31st. You must have a current rabies certificate in order to license your dog. You will also need to provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. We now offer on-line dog licensing, through the state's website at www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl

Please be aware that you must be able to submit your current rabies vaccination to us if requested when using the on-line licensing. Per state law, a \$25 late fee applies to any dog registration as of February 1st.

Visit our website www.windsor.maine.gov for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, tax maps, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not at this time accept payment online nor by phone.

The following page contains records of deaths and marriages from January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2018. There were 27 recorded births for the Town of Windsor.

Registrar of Voters

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. In order to vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a Driver's License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address. If you are planning to be out of town on Election Day, you may request an absentee ballot. The request must be made at least three business days prior to voting day, unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 30 days prior to an election

Voting is held upstairs at the Windsor Town Hall, 523 Ridge Road, Windsor ME. There is a lift available, just ask the staff for assistance if needed.

Currently there are 1,866 Registered Voters in Windsor. There are 432 Democrat, 672 Republican, 111 Green Independent, and 651 Unenrolled.

I would like to thank the following people for their help and hard work during the elections this year. Residents stepped in as moderator, warden, ballot clerk, election clerk, deputy registrar, and even helped set up and take down voting booths. I appreciate all you have done and are willing to do to help make our election days less stressful. Thank you!

* The \$25 late fee for dog licenses applied for after January 31st is imposed by the State statute, and nothing in the law vests any discretion in a municipal clerk or any other official to waive this fee (*see 7 M.R.S.A. § 3923-A(4)*) The late fee is in addition to the annual license fee before any license applied for after January 31st can be issued.

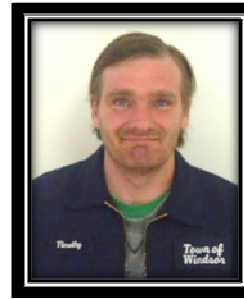

The Committee has been active this year in implementing projects for our Cemeteries to continue to be beautiful and attractive.

As mentioned last year, we are experiencing difficulty with a plant called Hawkweed. In June, the Turf Doctor will be working at Resthaven to see if we can get this issue under control. At the beginning of the Maxcys Mill Road from the Route 32 entrance down to the first entry way into the cemetery and across to the fence and back to 32 is where the work will be done. It consists of killing off the weed and not being able to seed until fall. Therefore, please beware that while this is work in progress it will not look that great.

We had more stone work done this year and some of this work will be completed before June.

We anticipate that we will have more stone work that will need to be done from this past winter and this work will be done nearer to late summer and fall.

Windsor Veterans Memorial Committee Report

In 2017, there was some discussion at one of the Town Selectmen's meeting that the 1947 Vault was in some desperate need of repairs, after much discussion and whether it would be feasible to save the Vault. It was brought up that a new and larger Veteran's Memorial Monument would be desirable instead of repairing the Vault.

It was received with much enthusiasm and since that time a Committee Board was implemented along with a Fundraising Committee.

We started immediately with the Fundraising. The timing was right with upcoming gatherings that Windsor and surrounding communities would be attending.

Right away, Dwight Tibbetts of the Downeast Brass Band approached us to do a benefit concert. The concert was extraordinary. It had a patriotic theme with some wonderful stories and music that gave tribute to veterans. The following year Dwight contacted the Fundraising Committee and offered to do another benefit. This was a father and son concert. The concert was amazing.

Several memorial companies that have done large Veteran Memorials were contacted on how to proceed with what we were looking to accomplish.

Provost Monuments out of Benton was extremely helpful and designed a monument specifically for Windsor. They held an informational meeting at the Town Hall and the public was invited.

The monument is 16 ½ feet long and 8 feet tall. The Memorial will be made of Norway Granite including colors of Red, White and Blue. The estimated cost is \$42,000 and we will be raising additional monies for the landscaping of the memorial area.

The following Fundraising Events have taken place in 2017 and 2018 and thus far raised \$14,100.61. Thus, paid our first 1/3rd payment of \$14,000.

This honorable project that the town has taken upon to achieve could not be accomplished without the many volunteers, the Fundraising Committee, the Selectmen, Town Manager, the Board members and most importantly you the towns people. Thank you so much for everything everyone has done, thus far, to achieve this goal.

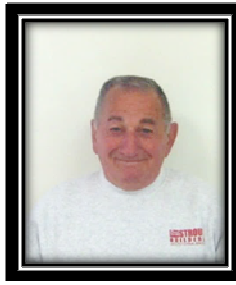

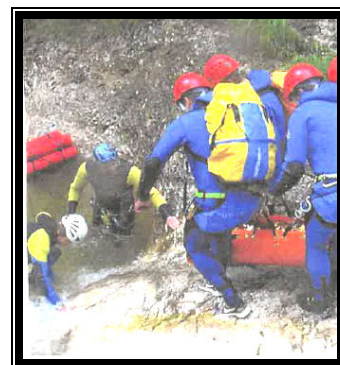

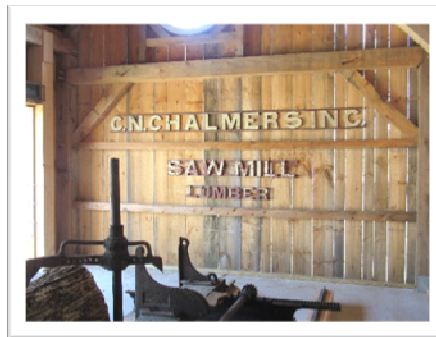

The Windsor Historical Society has been active since 1973. Our mission is to gather, restore and display historical buildings and artifacts for the residents of Windsor and all those who attend Windsor Fair to enjoy. Our complex is comprised of more than ten antique buildings; most were built in Windsor or surrounding towns and later moved to the fairgrounds. The buildings are furnished with period artifacts and we offer demonstrations in many of them during Windsor Fair.

2018-2019 was a busy time for the museum. In November 2016 a water powered Ricker circular saw mill manufactured in 1890 was donated to us. The mill operated in Albion until 1997 sawing lumber for area families and businesses. The mill was dismantled and moved to its new home on the fairgrounds in 2018. We operated the mill during Windsor Fair with three to four sawing demos daily. Also we have a shingle mill dating back to the 1890s in the same building and hope to be offering milling demos during fair week.

The wind mill tower, originally used by the Weeks Mills Water District to pump water to a storage tank for about 20 water association households is functional; look for it to be pumping water during fair week.

We also hope to have the broom making machine/factory installed by fair week.

The Windsor Historical Society could not continue to prosper without all of our volunteers and many donations. We thank the carpenters, craftsmen and craftswomen, laborers, roofers, cooks and demonstrators who contribute to our mission. Donations include financial gifts, lumber, many pounds of screws and nails, equipment and equipment operators, roofers and many, many more.

We invite you all to come and enjoy the museum and demonstrations during Windsor Fair. We may also be available at other times for tours of the grounds. Our monthly meetings are the second Wednesday of the month, April through November; they are held in the Malta Room on the fairgrounds and all are welcome to attend. Like our page on Facebook.

2019 Assessors' Agent Report

This may be the year that we receive the benefit of property tax relief. There are proposals before the Legislature for the following changes:

- Increase the Homestead Exemption to \$50,000 for disabled Veterans;
- Increase the Homestead Exemption to \$50,000 for persons 75 years of age or older;
- Fully Restore State-Municipal Revenue Sharing for FY 2018-2019;
- Make personal property tax assessment optional;
- Increase the Veteran's Exemption to \$25,000 regardless of age if they served at least 90 days, \$50,000 if the Veteran is disabled at a 50% to 90% rate and to \$100,000 if 100% disabled;
- Increase the Homestead Exemption to \$50,000 for all homesteads and include a 100% reimbursement from the State;
- Fully Fund State-Municipal Revenue Sharing at the 5% rate and issue payments 6 months earlier; and
- Increase the Exemption of Farm Machinery from \$10,000 to \$45,000.

If any of these changes are approved, the Assessors will include them in the annual tax assessment, but this report is written in March and at that time, under current law for taxes assessed on April 1, 2019 the Homestead Exemption value will be \$20,000. To qualify for the Maine Homestead Exemption, you must be a legal resident of the State of Maine, have owned residential property in Maine for at least the past twelve months and the homestead must be your permanent place of residence. You can only claim the exemption for one property and cannot claim the exemption in any other state. When a property is sold, the exemption is removed and the new homeowner must apply for the exemption. Applications for this program are available at the Town Office and must be filed by April 1 each year. Applications received after the filing date are not valid for the current year. Once your application has been approved, it is automatically renewed each year that you qualify for the exemption.

The Maine Veteran Property Tax Exemption is currently \$6,000. You qualify for an exemption if: 1) You served in the U.S. Armed Forces during a recognized war period or other recognized service period or you received an Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal; and 2) You will be at least 62 years old on April 1 or you are receiving a total disability pension from the U.S. Government. An important change was made to the Veteran's Exemption eligibility. The law eliminated the requirement that a veteran of the Vietnam War must have served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days. If you are a veteran of the Vietnam War who would otherwise qualify for the exemption in the past, but did not because of the 180 days of service requirement, this change would allow you to apply for the Veteran Exemption.

All participants with parcels enrolled in the Maine Tree Growth Tax Program are required to certify to a current forest management and harvest plan and file an application and Forest Type Map with the local assessor every ten years. If a piece of property enrolled in the Program was transferred, the new owner has one year from the date of transfer to comply with the provisions of the law. Landowners who fail to meet the requirements of the law are disqualified from classification, and must be withdrawn from the program and the required penalty assessed by the Town.

The Maine Residents Property Tax and Rent Refund "Circuitbreaker" Program was repealed and replaced by an income tax credit called the Property Tax Fairness Credit that is claimed on the Maine Individual Income Tax Form. This program is administered by the Income/Estate Tax Division of Maine Revenue Services. Assistance in applying for this credit is available by calling 207-626-8475 weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Assessors' Agent's schedule is available at the Town Office by the first of each month. If you would like to meet with me, please call the office to schedule an appointment.

Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of Town of Windsor, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2018, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. My opinion of the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge I obtain during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, I have also issued my report dated September 14, 2018, on my consideration of Town of Windsor, Maine's internal control over financial reporting and on my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of my audit.

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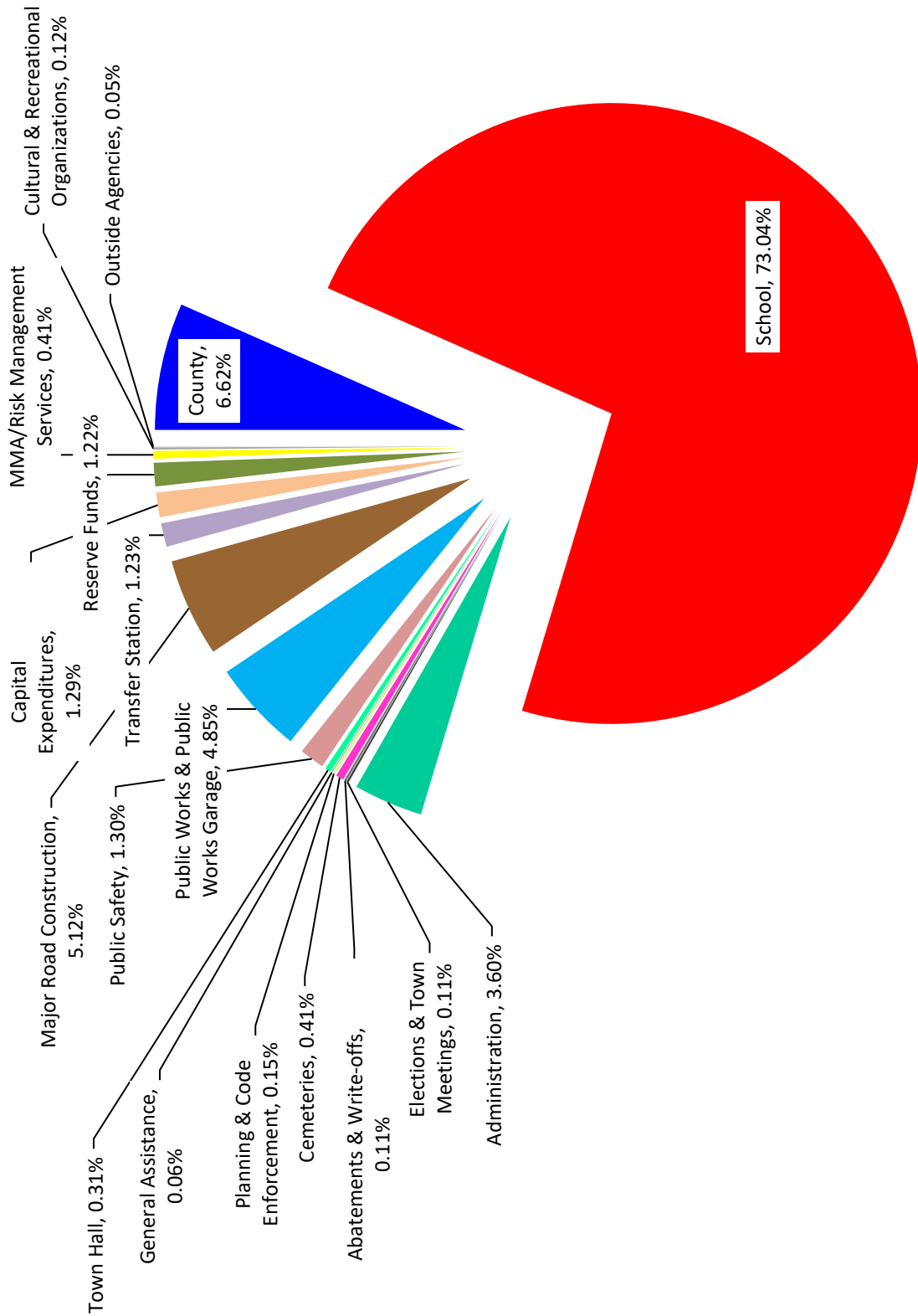

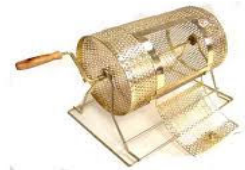

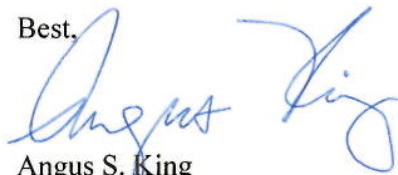
As I travel Maine, I hear from people who live in every corner of our state. I hear about their achievements, their successes, their work to improve their communities – I hear about the hope they have for our state. I also hear about our challenges, and all the work we have left to do. As I see it, that's my job: to listen to you, act where I can to build on what's good, and work on the tough parts. As 2018 comes to a close, I wanted to take a moment to share an update on some of the work we're doing in Washington to lift up the accomplishments of Maine people and make progress on the challenges they face.

From Portland to Presque Isle, from Milo to Camden, I hear about the pain that the opioid epidemic is inflicting on Maine communities. I've met with Maine people in recovery, family members of those struggling with substance use disorders, treatment providers, and law enforcement officials to learn about their experiences with this terrible disease, and everyone agrees that in order to fully respond to these problems, we need a stronger federal effort to end the opioid epidemic. Fortunately, some help is on the way – in October, we overwhelmingly passed a sweeping, bipartisan opioids bill. I've pushed hard for this type of legislation and was proud to have provisions I've advocated for included in the bill. These priorities have been guided by the voices of Maine people, and we'll keep working to confront this tragic problem.

I've also worked to strengthen the future of our forest economy. Maine's forests have powered our state's economy for generations, especially in our rural communities. So, when rapid shifts in the market led to the closure of many pulp and paper mills and biomass power plants, it required a collaborative approach to support future growth in this important industry. That's why, together with the other members of the state's Congressional delegation, I pushed to establish the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT). This integrated, multiagency effort aims to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy, and we're already seeing the benefits: in recent months, several forest industry businesses have announced significant investments into Maine operations, and in September 2018, the Forest Opportunity Roadmap (FOR)/Maine released an action plan to make sure this industry, and the rural communities it supports, can continue to thrive for generations to come.

As I close this letter, please allow me to express my gratitude to each of you – for your dedication to our state, and to one another. It's often said that Maine is like a big small town (with very long streets)—that's because at our heart, we're one big community. It's not only a pleasure to serve you— it's a pleasure to know you. Thank you for being the reason Maine is so special. Mary and I hope that 2019 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and our great State.

Dear Friends,

I hope this message finds you well. I am honored to represent you and your family and am grateful for the chance to offer both an update from Congress and my thoughts on the year ahead.

In Maine, we care less about political parties than about getting the job done. That's why I'm happy to report several recent victories I had reaching across the aisle to address issues important to our state.

Signed into law after months of deadlock, the 2018 Farm Bill contained several provisions I introduced. We were able to boost local food investment and organic research programs that are important to the Maine farmers driving a resurgence in our agricultural economy. The bill also created a pilot program to help doctors write prescriptions and offer vouchers to patients who need to change their diet but can't afford fresh food. Finally, the legislation included several steps I introduced to reduce food waste, a national problem that is not only costly to the environment and economy, but a missed opportunity to help millions of Americans who don't have enough to eat.

At the end of 2018, the President signed into law legislative language I introduced to assist veterans who had been blindsided by debt with the Department of Veterans Affairs. After hearing from several veterans who did not receive mailings about their debt until it was too late to take action, I introduced a bill to require the VA to improve its notification system. The final legislation requires that veterans have the option of getting electronic notifications and that the VA report on the underlying issues.

And on the House Appropriations Committee, I worked to protect programs that our state relies on, such as small business grants, rural broadband investment, effective responses to the opioid epidemic, shipbuilding at Bath Iron Works, and more.

As a new Congress gets underway, I will keep working with Republicans to make progress on key issues like these. But with Democrats now in the majority, I look forward to having an open debate on problems that have been ignored for too long. This includes the gun violence plaguing our nation, the dangers climate change presents to our country, crushing student loan debt, the influence of big money in politics, and the need for all Americans to access affordable health care and prescriptions.

In Washington and Maine, my offices stand ready to answer your questions, listen to feedback, and assist with federal issues and agencies. My hard-working staff helps many hundreds of constituents every year and I welcome the chance to serve you.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our state have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, I worked to help ensure the well-being of our seniors. The *SeniorSafe Act I* authored became law last year and is empowering banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions to better protect seniors from financial fraud.

Following extensive committee investigations of prescription drug pricing, additional legislation I crafted became law, ending the egregious practice of pharmacy “gag clauses” that prevented pharmacists from informing patients on how to pay the lowest possible price.

This year, I was also successful in securing an extra \$425 million for Alzheimer’s research—the largest funding increase ever—bringing the total to \$2.34 billion. Additionally, the bipartisan *BOLD Act I* authored will create public health infrastructure to combat Alzheimer’s by promoting education, early diagnosis, and improved care management.

More than 40 million Americans—including 178,000 Mainers—are caregivers for parents, spouses, children, and other loved ones with disabilities or illnesses, such as Alzheimer’s. The *RAISE Family Caregivers Act I* authored was signed into law last year, giving caregivers more resources and training to better balance the full-time job of caregiving. Another law I wrote will help grandparents who are raising grandchildren, largely due to the opioid addiction crisis.

In addition to helping seniors, a major accomplishment over the past year is the increased federal investment in biomedical research that is leading to progress in the fight against numerous devastating diseases. Congress has boosted funding for the National Institutes of Health by \$7 billion in just the last three years, bringing total funding to more than \$39 billion.

One of my highest priorities as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee is to improve our nation’s crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine’s needs are addressed. Since the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Grants program, formerly known as TIGER, was established in 2009, I have secured \$160 million for vital transportation projects throughout Maine.

Congress also delivered a Farm Bill last year, which includes many important provisions that will help the agriculture industry in Maine and across the country. Specifically, I secured provisions that will strengthen support for young farmers, improve local farm-to-market efforts, and increase funding for organic research.

Congress took decisive action to address the opioid addiction epidemic. In addition to appropriating \$8.5 billion in federal funding last year, Congress enacted the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act*, a comprehensive package that embraces the multipronged approach I have long advocated for this epidemic: prevention, treatment, recovery, and enforcement to stop drug trafficking.

Maine plays a key role in ensuring a strong national defense. In 2018, Congress provided funding for five ships to be built at Bath Iron Works, which will help to keep our nation safe and provide our skilled shipbuilders a steady job. I also secured more than \$162 million for infrastructure projects at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to support their important work to overhaul Navy submarines.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2018, I cast my 6,834th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Citizens of Maine:

For the past eight years as your Governor, my priority has been to make Maine prosperous. I am proud to say that my administration has had some success, but there is more that can be done.

Mainers experienced strong, record-setting economic growth in 2018, setting so many new records: a record-high number of employers; a record-high number of private-sector jobs; record-high revenues for the state; record-low unemployment; and the fastest net-earnings growth in New England. Our poverty rate declined to the lowest since 2005 with the fewest number of children in poverty in 17 years. Maine's future is the brightest it has been in decades: there's more new businesses, more money in your paycheck, and better opportunities for our children. And that's what it's all about: the future of our state.

We have brought stability to state finances and implemented pro-business, pro-growth policies across state government. The incoming administration is taking on a state government that is vastly improved—both structurally and financially—from the one I inherited. Everyone should contribute to the operation of local community governments.

I encourage you to pay attention to what happens in your municipality and in Augusta. So many good people have worked much too hard to achieve our current prosperity. We must avoid letting politicians drive Maine's finances and its economy back into the ground. I promise you that I will be watching.

First, let me thank you for reelecting me to represent you at the State House in Augusta. It truly is an honor to serve the constituents of District 13 in the Maine Senate. I am eager to get to work so that Maine becomes an even better place to make a decent living and raise a family. I would like to provide you with a few highlights of the 128th Legislature as well as my vision for the upcoming legislative session, which convened in December.

During my time as a member of the Maine Senate, it has been encouraging to see the significant progress that has occurred. The State of Maine closed the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2018 with a budget surplus of more than \$126 million and a ‘rainy day fund’ totaling more than \$274 million, allowing our state to have a better borrowing capacity and long-term financial stability. Following years of budget shortfalls and high spending, the significance of these economic achievements cannot be overstated. Maine’s unemployment is at an all-time low, and the state’s jobless rate has been below four percent for a record 31 consecutive months.

Perhaps the most significant action the 128th Legislature took was passing tax conformity. In doing so, we ensured that Maine citizens would not see their tax burden increase as a result of the federal changes to the tax code. Additionally, the tax conformity legislation included a \$300 child credit and increased the property tax fairness credit. Serving as Chair of the Taxation Committee at the time, I was incredibly proud that both sides of the aisle could come together to benefit the Maine people.

As we head into the 129th Legislature, I have been elected by my colleagues to serve as the Senate Republican Leader. The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2018. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections' Services, Civil Process and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including Drug Investigations, K-9, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, and Accident Reconstruction.

In 2018 Deputy Sheriffs serving in the Law Enforcement Division both in full-time and part-time capacity logged thousands calls for service. As a result deputies made 682 arrests, issued 759 traffic summonses, and responded to 628 motor vehicle accidents. Deputy Sheriffs also responded to 407 alarms, 161 domestic disturbances, and assisted other agencies 746 times. Deputies and Detectives made 80 drug seizures, 26 of which most were opiate related.

Sergeant Jacob Pierce resigned his position as a patrol sergeant and will be working with the Oakland Police Department. His professionalism will be missed at Kennebec.

Deputy Aaron Moody resigned his position within the patrol division, taking a position with the U.S. Secret Service.

Deputies Ivano Stefanizzi, Devon Polizzotti and Keith Madore were hired to fill those open positions within the patrol division. We welcome them and their families to the Sheriff's Office family.

Our Civil Process deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2018, the four civil deputies received over 9,031 requests for service in Kennebec County.

Danny Boivin a retired Augusta Police Sergeant, filled the vacant Civil Deputy position and has made a great addition to the civil team.

In 2018, our Correctional Facility managed 2,744 inmates, 211 less than 2017. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Burglaries to Homicides. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns.

Our correctional facility has also been helping out our fellow counties that have had serious overcrowding issues. Overcrowding can create an unsafe working environment for the corrections officers as well as the inmates.

The CARA Program (Criminogenic Addiction Recovery Academy) continues and we have added two weeks to the program. The last two weeks of the program involve the participants working at area businesses. Upon their release, the participants have steady employment and a brighter future. Our program not only benefits Kennebec County inmates, it benefits all 16 counties who have individuals who meet the criteria.

Qualifying inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are considered to be a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised by our programs officers on outside projects.

The outside work crews have partnered with local municipalities providing snow removal to those individuals who are elderly or have disabilities. Programs Officer Gagnon and Matthews and their work crews raised 16,847 pounds of produce and gleaned 4,930 pounds of produce for the inmate kitchen, area food pantries, churches, homeless shelters, schools and elder programs in 2018.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

Highway fatalities and serious injuries continue soared as a result of individuals using electronic devices when operating a motor vehicle. Please do not be a statistic or make others a statistic because of carelessness.

As your Sheriff, in 2019 my focus will remain on my staff, risk management and professional services to the residents of Kennebec County.

Service Report – Windsor 2018

Delta Ambulance, founded in 1972, is the leading provider of high quality, compassionate emergency services and medical transportation in central Maine. Our superior training, experience and state-of-the-art medical technology sets us apart from other ambulance services.

We are pleased to be able to provide emergency Paramedic care to the people of your town and to continue supporting your First Response Rescue at no cost to your community. As a regional not-for-profit organization, we continue to fund our operations solely by reimbursement directly from the patient and the patient's insurance. This is possible due to our economy of scale. A significant portion of our patient charges, annually, are written off as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured. Additionally, we continue to support community events throughout our coverage area.

In 2018 (January 1 – December 31), we responded to 200 911-calls. Of these, 144 required immediate Advanced Life Support care and transport. The remaining 56 calls did not require transport and therefore those patients were not invoiced for our services. Additionally, we serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients as well as standby for fire calls.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 14.8 minutes for emergencies.

Paramedic care is the highest level of Pre-Hospital care available. Our Paramedics exceed State Standards for recertification and respond with the latest medical technology available including 12 lead EKG and pharmaceutical interventions. Our care is reviewed in our Continuing Quality Improvement (CQI) program, which is recognized as a leading process in Maine.

Our support for your Rescue Services continues to include continuing medical/rescue education and on-scene replacement of medical supplies used on the call, all at no cost to the town.

Dear Residents of Windsor,

For us who work at, attend, or support Erskine Academy, last year we experienced a school committed to providing a high-quality education to all of its learners and saw its core values—*scholarship, leadership, stewardship, and relationships*—at work to produce amazing results. We can be justifiably proud of how we have grown and for what we have accomplished this past year.

In our 136th year, Erskine Academy continued to be your high school of choice that combines an independent school education with the democratic ideal of a quality education for all. We focused our efforts on improving our school, expanding opportunities for learning in and out of the classroom, and accelerating student achievement. A few facts about Erskine Academy today are a testament to our vitality and value:

- With 580 students in grades nine through twelve, we are the largest town academy in Maine to serve a nearly 100% local student body on a 100% school choice basis
- A 13:1 professional teacher to student ratio
- A 97% four-year graduation rate
- A dropout rate of less than one percent
- Of 139 graduates in 2018, 82% were accepted to higher or continuing education (now a six-year trend), many to highly selective colleges and universities
- For a fourth consecutive year, we are one of five Maine high schools to make the *Washington Post's* list of *America's Most Challenging High Schools*, a distinction based on the number of Advanced Placement courses and exams taken by our students

Although we have experienced an increase in private-pay students from central Maine, we remain fully committed to our publicly-funded students by admitting all students from our eight sending towns who have completed the eighth grade and can benefit from our programs. To maintain this local heritage, for a ninth time we hosted nearly 250 area sixth graders for an early exposure to high school program designed to build their familiarity with and confidence in doing high school work.

Regardless of differences in residence, prior learning, interests, abilities, or personal circumstances and backgrounds, all of our students matter and belong. All who attend here experience a school program that blends traditional values with contemporary programs and best practices to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in the region.

We have always considered industry certificates, two-year degrees, apprenticeships, and military service as higher education and as such, viable pursuits. Therefore, we have created and sustained a comprehensive academic program to reflect and facilitate access to these as well as four-year degree programs. We are one of few high schools in the state to continue to offer shop technology, home and consumer economics, and business courses for exposure and entry-level work.

Staffed by three teachers and two educational technicians, Erskine's Special Education program educates and provides specialized support to students eligible for such services through an Individual Education Plan (IEP). Valuing all students and believing they deserve a welcoming school and professional teachers who will build on their strengths, 20% of our students receive academic assistance or Special Education services to support their learning.

In our sixth year as a *MELMAC Education Foundation* school, we increased students' preparedness and aspirations for continuing their education beyond high school, reduced barriers to accessing their higher education, and significantly reduced their need to take remedial courses

Now in its eighth year, our *Jobs for Maine Graduates (JMG)* program has increased student exposure to various forms of higher education and vocational trades programs and has taught essential work seeking, training, and

employment retention skills. With 73 students pursuing a certificate in a work craft or trade, our enrollment at the Capital Area Technical Center is second only to its host, Cony High School.

This past year, 113 students enrolled in one or more of our ten *Advanced Placement* courses, and 311 students took at least one of our 13 dual enrollment courses with nearby colleges including Kennebec Valley Community College, Thomas College, the University of Maine, and Husson University taught here by our teachers. For their efforts in these early college experiences, nearly one-half of our graduates earned college credits while in high school, collectively saving an estimated \$515,000 in college tuition.

Through our *International Student program* and *American Field Service (AFS)* club, we have helped our students gain understanding and interpersonal skills for living more globally and interdependently in a culturally diverse world. For an eighth time, AFS students made a humanitarian trip to Costa Rica to build homes for impoverished families. Eye-opening experiences such as this fire the heart and mind and inspire our students to look beyond EA and the familiar to a world that truly needs them. Currently, plans are underway for a second similar humanitarian trip to Guatemala.

Erskine began the 2018-19 school year by accepting and winning, for a second time, *WGME 13/Fox 23's School Spirit Challenge*. Participating in the program's Tournament of Champions, we raised a record-breaking 196,696 pounds of food for the Good Shepherd Food Bank of Maine and our local pantries, an amount twice that raised by any of the 60-plus competing Maine high schools in the five years and ten seasons of the competition. In leading this effort, we engaged with our communities to strengthen our relationships, enhance the Erskine experience, and provide a critical community service—fighting hunger in Maine.

Other examples of our student and staff's goodwill include the fifth annual *Trunk or Treat* program that this year provided a safe observation of Halloween for well over 500 youngsters, our largest attendance to date. The Lady Eagles Basketball Team was the nation's top achiever at the high school level of the *Coaches vs. Cancer 3-point Challenge*, having raised \$10,000 in donations. And our eleventh annual *Cancer Walk* yielded \$5,800 to benefit Maine General Medical Center's Alford Center, bringing our contributions to date to \$47,727.

Erskine Academy reflects proudly and appreciatively on its 136 years of progress and performance. Since our founding in 1883, Erskine Academy has remained true to its mission while evolving to meet new demands, challenges, and uncertainties. Because there is no limit to what we can do, pursuing excellence and implementing our mission is a continuous and unyielding work in progress.

We give heartfelt appreciation to our alumni and friends who believe strongly enough in our values and results that they give their time, talents, and financial donations to supplement our state-set tuition rate. Their investment permits us to invest in programs and enhancements beyond what can be supported through tuition alone and raises the expectations we have for ourselves. One example of their generosity is last year's gym floor renovation, which was more than half paid for with private funds.

We are grateful as well to our students, families, and sending communities for their confidence in and support for Erskine Academy. Together, we create a school and legacy that adheres to what we know is right and good for our young people and aids them in constructing a sturdy start for adulthood. Graduates do not leave us without having an academic and a personal success story to tell.

Thank you, Windsor residents, for sustaining high school choice for your young people and families, an opportunity for learning that is available to only 3% of Maine students, despite two-thirds of Maine voters agreeing that school choice programs should be open to all. Those families who have exercised that choice to attend Erskine Academy—entrusting us with the intellectual and personal development of their children—inspire and honor us and motivate us to make an excellent school even better. In partnership with you, we look forward to new challenges and accomplishments in the year ahead.

The 2018-2019 school year has been an exciting and productive year so far at Windsor Elementary School. The Sheepscot Valley RSU 12 educators, Windsor staff, and the RSU 12 Board of Directors continues to work towards its vision of "Building a foundation of lifetime learning for our students, families, and communities by inspiring growth, change, and success for all students."

A special thank you to Windsor School Board members, Tom McNaughton, Monique Crummett, and Jerry Nault who have been dedicated board members and an influential part of creating the successful progress we have made in RSU 12 for Windsor students. They have all committed hours and hours of volunteer time to the students, staff, and citizens of Windsor. Jerry Nault is one of the longest-serving members of the RSU 12 Board. Tom McNaughton serves on the Finance and Facilities Committees and Monique Crummett serves on the Policy and Anti-Bullying Committee. They are all committed to the education of Windsor students and RSU 12 students as a whole and work to create policies and school budgets that support our students.

It has been an exciting year at Windsor Elementary School which is under the new leadership of Principal Heather Wilson. Students and staff at Windsor Elementary School continue to impress with countless awards and recognitions in academics and athletics. All educators at Windsor Elementary School and throughout RSU 12 are focused on creating a personalized, proficiency-based learning environment where all students can thrive. We believe that all learners learn in different ways and in different time frames. A personalized learning environment provides a structure that creates flexibility and allows students to progress as they demonstrate mastery of academic content and skills.

RSU 12 has successfully established PreK classrooms throughout the district. PreK Students are transported by bus fifteen minutes to Somerville Elementary School. Contact Windsor Elementary school for more information. Our PreK program is a collaborative venture with Head Start, which means that state and federal dollars fully reimburse the program.

The 2019-2020 RSU 12 school budget has been approved by the RSU 12 Board of Directors and will be presented at the District Budget meeting on May 16, 2019, at Chelsea Elementary School for approval by RSU 12 citizens. The school budget referendum is on June 11, 2019. The proposed RSU 12 school budget is \$23,022,981, a local increase of 3.4%. The increase is primarily due to a 2% increase in our student population. Information about the budget is available on our website. Please attend the RSU 12 district budget meeting at Chelsea Elementary School on Thursday, May 16th at 6:30pm. As always, the RSU 12 Board of Directors has worked to develop a school budget that supports our students while remaining fiscally conservative. RSU 12 and the Windsor community continue to work together to provide inspiring educational opportunities for our students.

GREETINGS:

In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, qualified by law to vote in Windsor affairs, to meet at the WINDSOR TOWN HALL, in said Town of Windsor on TUESDAY, the ELEVENTH day of JUNE, 2019 A.D. at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then and there to act on Article 1 and Articles 2 through 5 are going to be voted upon at the polls by secret ballot. **The Polls shall be opened at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots will be processed at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.**

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the WINDSOR TOWN HALL in said Town of Windsor on WEDNESDAY the TWELFTH day of JUNE 2019 A.D. at 6:30 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 6 through 41 will be voted on at the open Town Meeting;

All articles being set out below to wit:

ARTICLE 1. ELECTION OF MODERATOR: To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICIALS: To elect all necessary Town of Windsor Officers/Officials by Secret Ballot.

ARTICLE 3. VOTERS' PETITION FOR SECRET BALLOT VOTE: "Shall this Municipality authorize the State to issue licenses for the sale of Malt Liquor and Wine to be consumed off the premises of licensed establishments on Sundays?"

ARTICLE 4. VOTERS' PETITION FOR SECRET BALLOT VOTE: "Shall this Municipality authorize the State to issue licenses for the sale of Liquor to be consumed on the premises of licensed establishments on days other than Sunday?"

ARTICLE 5. VOTERS' PETITION FOR SECRET BALLOT VOTE: "Shall this Municipality authorize the State to issue licenses for the sale of Liquor to be consumed on the premises of licensed establishments on Sundays?"

ARTICLES 6 THROUGH 16 DEAL WITH TAX & FISCAL ADMINISTRATIONS

ARTICLE 6. TAX ADMINISTRATION: To see what method the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor will adopt for collection of taxes in FY2020.

- A. The payments, as stated on the bills, shall be due and payable on September 30, 2019 and March 31, 2020.
- B. The Tax Collector shall accept no advance payments, except as provided in section C below, before commitment of taxes.
- C. The Town will treat all overpayment of taxes as prepayments on next year's taxes pursuant to 36 MRSA §506 and shall pay no interest on such payments.
- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 3.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. Charge interest at the rate of 7.0 % per annum, on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2020.
- G. Administration of Tax Acquired Property:
 - 1. Authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of tax acquired property as they shall deem to be necessary and in the best interests of the Town, except that the Board of Selectmen shall use the special sale process required by 36 M.R.S. § 943-C for qualifying homestead property if they choose to sell it to anyone other than the former owner(s).
 - 2. Authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver quit claim deeds, without covenant, for the conveyance of such property.
 - 3. Give delinquent taxpayers a thirty (30) day grace period in which to buy back their property upon payment of all taxes, liens, interest, and other applicable costs.

- D. The agreement is automatically terminated if a scheduled payment is late, and the taxpayer then becomes subject to the same due date(s) and interest date(s) and rate as other taxpayers who are not participating in a tax club;
- E. Only taxpayers who do not have outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program; and

- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly-advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

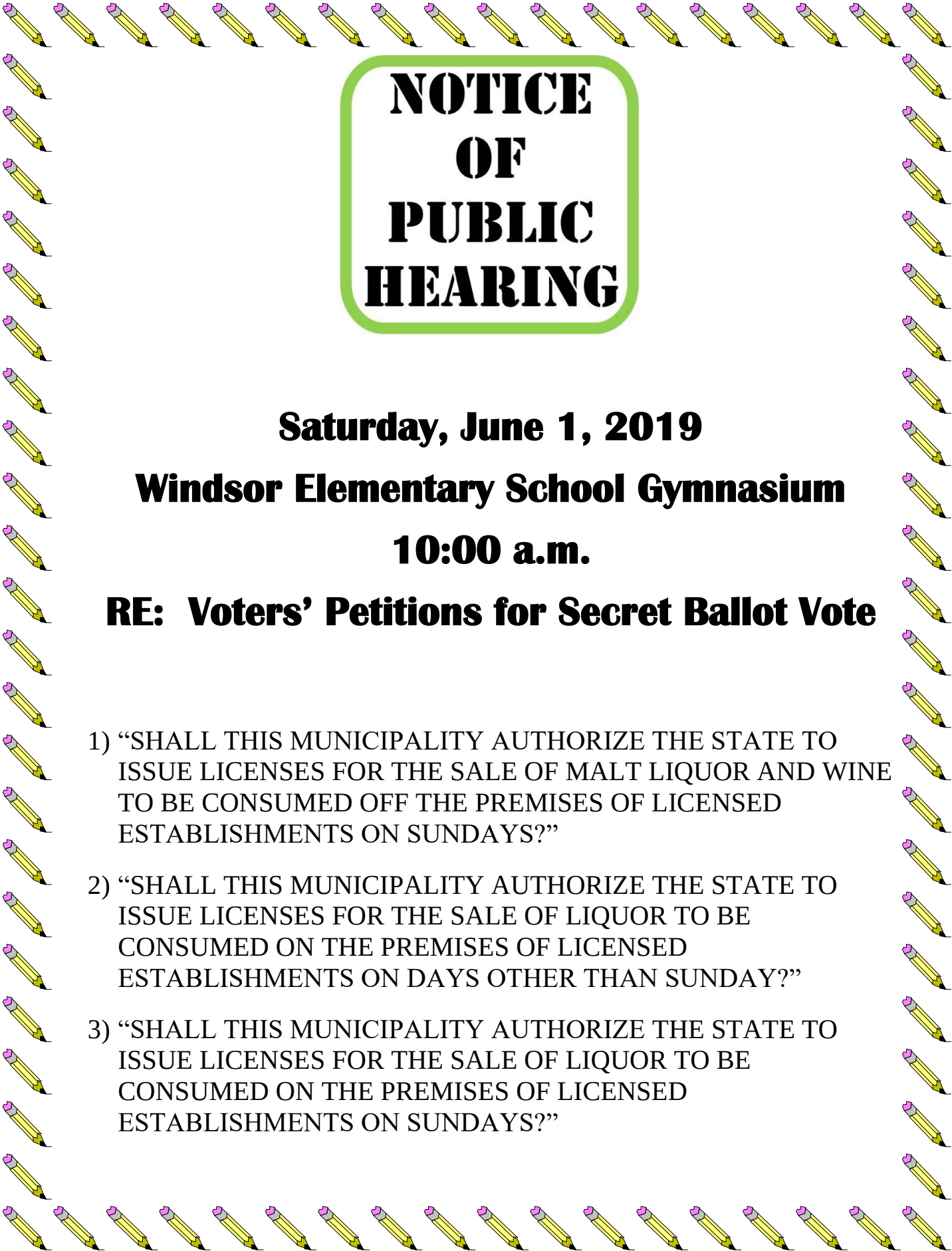

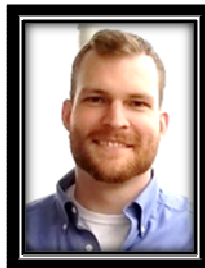

Notice of Rabies Clinic

The Windsor Voluntary Fire Department will be sponsoring a **Rabies Clinic** at the Windsor Fire Station, 671 South Belfast Road, on **Saturday, December 14, 2019** from **12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m.** The fee is **\$10.00** per animal.

All dogs must be on a leash and all cats must be in containers. Animals should be at least four (4) months of age and not pregnant. All dog owners are reminded that **dog licenses expire at the end of each calendar year** and should be renewed at the earliest possible date.

New tags are available by the middle of October.

A rabies certificate is good for three (3) years, **(unless it's the 1st rabies shot)** and owners **must** bring a **current** certificate to the Town Clerk, as well as the **spaying/neutering certificate** if applicable, when they wish to renew their pet's license.
