The Board of Selectmen is pleased to report continued progress on town improvements for the benefit of the citizens of Windsor.

We plan to continue our efforts to upgrade and improve our roads. We have reached above the 90% level of completion of road work in the last 10 years. We now hope to work on a maintenance schedule that will keep them in good condition for some years to come.

Our budget process this year has been completed and as always, we are awaiting the final version of the States' budget process. The prospect is for a significant reduction in State funding this year due to the effects of Covid-19 on the economy.

As always, we welcome visitors to our regularly scheduled meetings every other Tuesday night beginning at 6 pm. The schedule is posted on our web site (www.windsor.maine.gov) and on the new electronic sign in front of the Town Office. You can also check the website for The Hub which we use to communicate important and/or special events.

Regarding special events, the Town has managed to remain available to the people of Windsor though the Covid-19 pandemic. At the beginning, we served people by using a drop box method where folks were able to bring their paperwork to the front door and call in for service. We then opened an outside walk up window for those that wanted more direct contact with the office personnel. We now have a walk-through process in place for those wanting face to face transactions (enter as usual but exit out the front of the building.)

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

This past year began strong with everything moving in a forward direction. The Town of Windsor's Financial Condition ending June 30, 2019 was \$1,330,774.00 and in good standing to comply with our auditor's recommendation of having at least three months' worth of expenses set aside in case of any unexpected emergencies.

Over the summer of 2019 we moved forward with Major Road Construction and had ditching, tree brush cutting, culvert replacements and paved the Piper Road, Coopers Mills Road, Griffin Road and Reed Road.

The winter was a challenging and strong one, but we were able to keep the bottom-line budget within its guidelines. We have filled the sand shed back up, mixing it with salt, without going over budget and are ready for next year. We had some Public Works truck repairs/breakdowns which made us go over what was budgeted but the bottom-line is still under budget.

Then March came and we had a pandemic on our hands with COVID-19 (Coronavirus). This made for a very challenging way of keeping our Town up and running. **Although the doors were locked to residents the Town Office never closed.** We were able to answer phone calls, handle transactions through the drop-box and mail and then moved to having a walk-up window open with taking the precautions that were recommended by the Governor and the Maine Center of Disease Control (MCDC). In June we re-opened the office doors for walk-in customers with the direction of the flow of traffic being the entrance still in the back but now exiting through the front of the building to complying with the Governor's order and the MCDC guidelines. **We are recommending masks be worn and to follow the social distancing guidelines recommended by the Governor's order and the MCDC.** Through these unprecedented times and changes being made daily we are here for you. (WINDSOR STRONG!!) **The Board of Selectmen voted to have all past registrations due by June 30, 2020.** This will allow the Town to maintain the cash flow and keep the town functioning. This was a very difficult time for us with having to get Budgets ready for the next year. The Board of Selectmen still met bi-weekly in person complying with the Governor's and MCDC orders.

The Governor moved the June election to July 14, 2020 which allowed the Board of Selectmen to also move ours to that date. The Board also voted to move the Town Meeting to July 15, 2020 at 6:30 p.m. **(All voting and Town Meeting will be at the WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – July 14, 2020 voting will be from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and July 15, 2020 Town Meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. - so we can comply with the Governor's order and MCDC guidelines for social distancing.)**

DON'T FORGET TO VOTE. ABSENTEE BALLOTS ARE NOW AVAILABLE.

Knowing the upcoming financial challenges that we will all be facing, I recommended the Town's Expense side of the budget be reduced from what was originally proposed and to end up with somewhere near a flat budget, which in return ended with less than last year. You will see most of these changes are within our Reserve Accounts. This was very challenging but under the circumstances this needed to be done. The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee agreed.

During the pandemic, the Transfer Station stayed open normal hours with having NO Recycling on Saturday's due to lack of staff. **We are recommending masks be worn by residents and having the residents remove their Municipal Solid Waste from their vehicle and place on the small scale for weighing. Keep in mind to social distance as much as possible.** We hope to re-open recycling to its normal hours soon.

Through the daily/weekly/monthly challenges of COVID-19 (Coronavirus) we have made the appropriate changes as recommended by the Governor and the MCDC and we are **"WINDSOR STRONG"** and will get through this together. I want to thank all Town of Windsor's dedicated employees, Board of Selectmen, and committee members for their commitment to the Town of Windsor.

The employees of the Town of Windsor strive to do the best job they can whether it is working in the Town Office, on our Town Roads for the Public Works Department or at the Transfer Station with our Recycling and Municipal Solid Waste.

Please remember to check on your neighbors and stay safe.

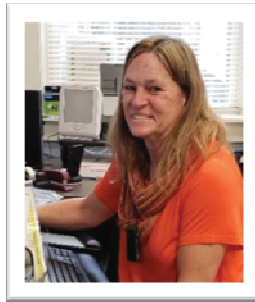
The Road Supervisor (Keith Hall) would like to thank his dedicated employees for the year-round projects, repairs on the trucks and the long winter hours during the winter storms.

Town Clerk's Report

Citizens of Windsor,

It has been my pleasure to serve the residents and greater communities of Windsor. I appreciate the support of the public and collaboration with our Town Manager, Select Board, fellow colleagues, departments, board and committee members, and election personnel.

The municipal clerk's office primary responsibilities include the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from September 1995, death records beginning in 2011, and marriage records beginning January 1, 2017 are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License.....	\$40.00
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....	\$15.00
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....	\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the Clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course in order to purchase a Hunting license.

There were 598 dogs registered and 1 kennel licenses issued in 2019. Dogs 6 months or older that reside in Windsor for longer than 10 days must be registered annually by December 31st.

You must have a current rabies certificate in order to license your dog. You will also need to provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. We now offer on-line dog licensing, through the state's website at www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl Please be aware that you must be able to submit your current rabies vaccination to us if requested when using the on-line licensing. Per state law, a \$25 late fee applies to any dog registration as of February 1st.

www.windsor.maine.gov for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, tax maps, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not at this time accept payment online nor by phone.

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. In order to vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a Driver's License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address. If you are planning to be out of town on Election Day, you may request an absentee ballot. The request must be made at least three business days prior to voting day unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 30 days prior to an election

2020 voting will be held at the Windsor Elementary School, 366 Ridge Road, Windsor, Maine on July 14, 2020 from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Currently there are 1,864 Registered Voters in Windsor. There are 423 Democrat, 694 Republican, 111 Green Independent, and 636 Unenrolled.

I would like to thank the following people for their help and hard work during the elections this year. Whether you were a moderator, warden, ballot clerk, election clerk, deputy registrar, or even just helping set up booths, I really appreciate all you have done and are willing to do to help make our elections run as smoothly as possible. 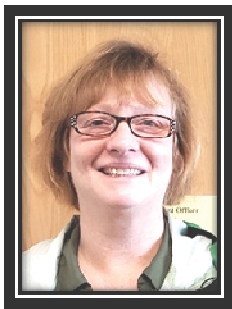

* The \$25 late fee for dog licenses applied for after January 31st is imposed by the State statute, and nothing in the law vests any discretion in a municipal clerk or any other official to waive this fee (*see 7 M.R.S.A. § 3923-A(4)*) The late fee is in addition to the annual license fee before any license applied for after January 31st can be issued.

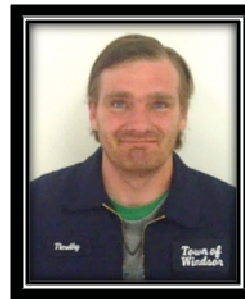
PLEASE NOTE:

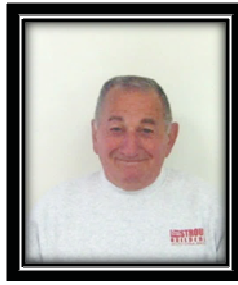

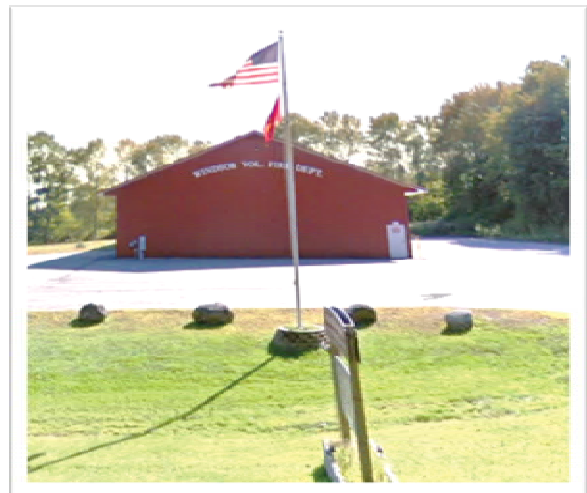

2020 Assessors' Agent Report

Under current Maine law, for taxes assessed on April 1, 2020 the Homestead Exemption value will be \$25,000. To qualify for the Maine Homestead Exemption, you must be a legal resident of the State of Maine, have owned residential property in Maine for at least the past twelve months and the homestead must be your permanent place of residence. You can only claim the exemption for one property and cannot claim the exemption in any other state. When a property is sold, the exemption is removed and the new homeowner must apply for the exemption. Applications must be filed by April 1 each year. Applications received after the filing date are not valid for the current year. Once your application has been approved, it is automatically renewed each year that you qualify for the exemption.

Legislation passed last year establishes the Property Tax Relief Fund for Maine Residents and requires the fund to be used to provide property tax relief payments directly to Maine residents whose residence qualifies for an exemption under the Maine homestead property tax exemption. When the fund reaches a target balance, the Treasurer of State is required, by March 1, to mail checks for the tax relief payment to each owner of a qualifying homestead. This year the payment was \$104 for each property that qualified for a Homestead exemption on April 1, 2019. To receive a check, you must have a Homestead exemption and you can't have a Homestead exemption unless you submit an application to the Assessors.

The Maine Veteran Property Tax Exemption is currently \$6,000. You qualify for an exemption if: 1) You served in the U.S. Armed Forces during a recognized war period or other recognized service period or you received an Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal; and 2) You will be at least 62 years old on April 1 or you are receiving a total disability pension from the U.S. Government. An important change was made to the Veteran's Exemption eligibility. The law eliminated the requirement that a veteran of the Vietnam War must have served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days. If you are a veteran of the Vietnam War who would otherwise qualify for the exemption in the past but did not because of the 180 days of service requirement, this change would allow you to apply for the Veteran Exemption.

A new law for this year is an exemption for renewable energy equipment. The law exempts solar and wind energy equipment, except that of industrial power suppliers, from property tax. A taxpayer claiming the exemption must file an application with the municipality in the first year the exemption is sought. Maine Revenue Services will be developing an application for this exemption and it should be available prior to the April 1 filing deadline. As soon as it is available, it will be posted to the Website or it can be picked up at the Town Office.

All participants with parcels enrolled in the Maine Tree Growth Tax Program are required to submit a current forest management and harvest plan and file an application and Forest Type Map with the local assessor every ten years. If a piece of property enrolled in the Program was transferred, the new owner has one year from the date of transfer to comply with the provisions of the law. Landowners who fail to meet the requirements of the law are disqualified from classification and must be withdrawn from the program. The required withdrawal penalty must be assessed by the Town.

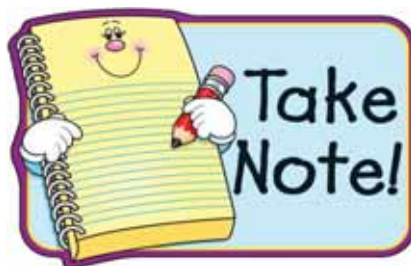

Report on the Financial Statements

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit. My opinion of the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge I obtain during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

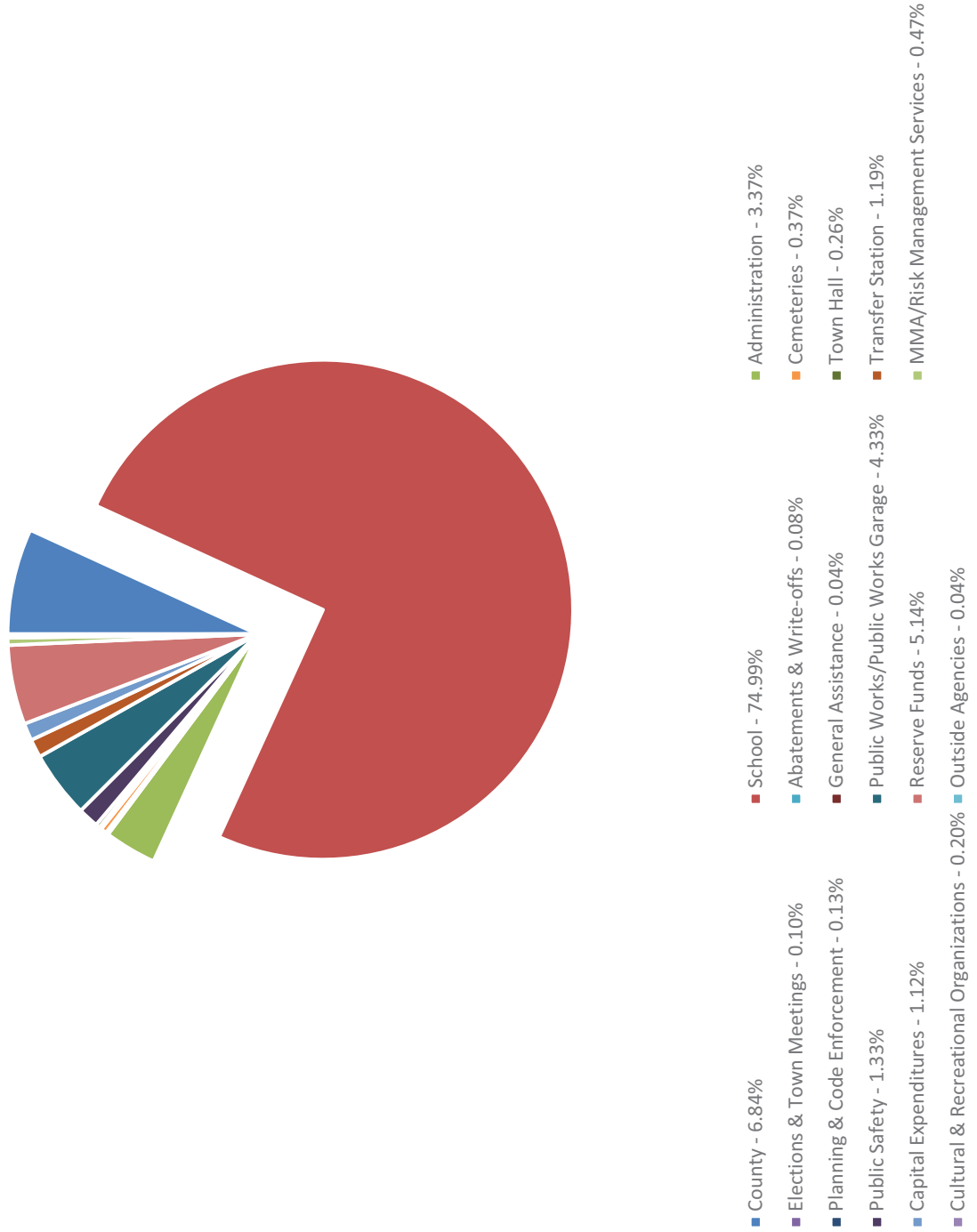


The beginning of a new year provides the opportunity to reflect on the progress of the past 12 months. If you have additional thoughts on encouraging preventive healthcare, please share them with my office.

This year has also continued the growth of Maine's forest products industry – a key focus of my work to revitalize Maine's rural economy and communities. We've seen significant investment in mills across the state, creating good jobs to support rural Maine. I'm also pleased that the investments aren't just in our mills – the industry is thriving because of its commitment to innovation. We're fortunate to have the University of Maine's top-notch researchers exploring cutting-edge ways to use our forest resources, including capitalizing on the rise of 3D printing technology with the world's largest 3D printer. Combining this work with ongoing federal support, our vast forests, and Maine's dedicated workforce, I know that the future of this industry is bright, and I'll continue working to support it on all fronts.

I'm proud of all we've accomplished together this year, but even as I reflect on all that we've achieved, it is challenging to not think of the work left undone. It sometimes can be discouraging to watch these important priorities hang in limbo, but fortunately for me, encouragement is never far. After all, I get to live in Maine – which means I get to count Maine people as my neighbors and friends. I'm always struck by the kindness that our citizens show not only to me, but also to each other. This focus on collaboration and compassion is an inspiration, and it powers my efforts bring a little bit of Maine common sense to Washington. Thank you for all you do to for our state – Mary and I are deeply grateful, and we hope that 2020 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and the State of Maine.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to represent you and your family and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

In 2019, I was honored to work with my colleagues to pass hundreds of bills that address everything from fighting climate change to raising the minimum wage. And while Congress has become an increasingly partisan place, I was proud to continue my habit of reaching across the aisle, introducing a number of bipartisan bills and cosponsoring even more.

On the House Appropriations Committee, I worked to support programs important to Maine, such as rural broadband investment, Head Start, PFAS clean up, and shipbuilding at Bath Iron Works. Further, I firmly believe we need to make substantial investments in all aspects of our infrastructure, from safe drinking water and modernized schools, to upgraded highways, transit, and rail. From my seat on the Appropriations Committee I advocated for increased funding for the BUILD grants program which funds investments in transportation infrastructure by states, local governments, and transit agencies. I also pushed for increased funding for the Community Development Block Grant program, our national park system, local and organic agriculture, election security, and the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Since my time in the Maine State Senate, lowering the cost of prescription drugs has been one of my top priorities. This year I introduced two bills that would help Americans afford their prescription medications. I also voted for a bill that would allow the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to directly negotiate prices for certain drugs. I look forward to continuing this important work in 2020 so Americans are no longer faced with the choice of picking up prescriptions they desperately need or putting food on the table.

I am sure this coming year holds many challenges and opportunities for our country, and I promise that the interests and principles of Mainers will continue to guide my work. If there is anything my offices in Washington or Maine can do to be of assistance – whether you, your town, or your organization is applying for a grant; you're facing an issue with a federal agency; or if you'd just like to share a thought or opinion – please do not hesitate to reach out.

Dear Friends,

As 2019 ends and 2020 begins, I am pleased to report that Congress made progress on a number of issues important to Maine families despite the polarization in our country.

In a major win for surviving military and retiree spouses to whom we are deeply indebted, I was proud to co-lead the repeal of what is often referred to as the “Military Widow’s Tax,” an unfair offset of survivor benefits that has prevented as many as 67,000 surviving spouses—including more than 260 from Maine—from receiving the full benefits they deserve.

The high cost of health care and prescription drugs continues to be a top issue for families and seniors. To provide continued relief for more lower- and middle-income individuals, I led the charge to extend for another two years the medical expense tax deduction that I included in the 2017 tax law. Without this extension, nearly 20,000 Mainers and millions of Americans with high medical expenses, including many with preexisting conditions, would have faced an increased tax burden. In other good news, the CREATES Act I cosponsored became law. It will prevent pharmaceutical companies from blocking access to a sufficient supply of brand-name drugs needed for the studies that allow less expensive alternatives to enter the marketplace.

Improving people’s health and wellbeing remains my priority. On a per capita basis, Maine has the highest incidence of Lyme disease in the country. In August, I held a Senate hearing at the University of Maine’s Tick Lab on this growing public health crisis. A comprehensive public health strategy to combat this epidemic is needed, and the new law I authored will do just that.

In addition, I helped champion another \$2.6 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health, our nation’s premiere biomedical research institution, including significant boosts for Alzheimer’s disease and diabetes research. Last year, NIH funded more than \$111 million for research at 14 Maine institutions.

To help prepare the graduates of Maine Maritime Academy, I secured \$300 million for a new training ship, which will ensure rigorous instruction for MMA students for decades to come.

Significant federal funding was approved for work at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Funding appropriated by Congress will pay for three new destroyers, make a down payment on an additional ship, and finance infrastructure improvements at PNSY.

As Chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have led efforts to improve our nation’s crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine’s housing needs are addressed. For Maine’s roads, bridges, airports, and seaports, tens of millions in federal funding will help make urgently needed upgrades and improve safety. Funding will also support housing assistance to low-income families and seniors and aid communities in reducing homelessness among our youth. The Community Development Block Grant program will assist numerous towns and cities in our State.

The Aging Committee I chair has continued its focus on financial security for our seniors. A new law I authored will make it easier for small businesses to offer retirement plans to their employees. Our Aging Committee’s Fraud Hotline fielded more than 1,200 calls this year. Congress passed a new law to crack down on robocallers who are often the perpetrators of these scams. And a new law I authored will expand the IRS’ Identity Protection PIN program nationwide to prevent identity theft tax refund fraud.

At the end of 2019, I cast my 7,262nd consecutive vote. In the New Year, I will keep working to deliver bipartisan solutions to the challenges facing Maine and the nation. The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2019. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections' Services, Civil Process and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including Drug Investigations, K-9, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, and Accident Reconstruction.

In 2019 Deputy Sheriffs serving in the Law Enforcement Division both in full-time and part-time capacity logged thousands calls for service. As a result deputies made 735 arrests or summonses, 544 traffic summonses issued, thousands of warnings and responded to 691 motor vehicle accidents. Deputy Sheriffs also responded to 338 alarms, 139 domestic disturbances, and assisted other agencies 498 times. Deputies and Detectives made 33 drug seizures. This is merely a snap shot of what we do during the year.

Deputy Michael Sayers resigned his position as a patrol deputy and will be working in the private sector. We wish Michael and his family well.

Deputies Zachary Carey and Elijah Curtis were hired to fill two vacant positions. We are very excited to have them join our Kennebec family. Both are very motivated and understand their responsibilities to the citizens of our county.

In December of 2019, Brenda Grimes, a 30 year employee of the correctional facility retired. Brenda's ability to communicate with and control a block of inmates was noteworthy. She will be missed. This summer Brenda plans on taking a trip to Southeast Asia and to see the world. We are in hopes that Brenda will continue to knit hats for Justice Fuller, so his ears stay warm in the winter months.

Our Civil Process deputies served legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2019, the three civil deputies received over 9,722 requests for service in Kennebec County. 691 more calls for document service than in 2018.

In 2019, our Correctional Facility managed 2,686 inmates, a slight dip from 2018. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from harassment to homicide.

The CARA Program (Criminogenic Addiction Recovery Academy) continues and we have added two weeks to the program. The last two weeks of the program involve the participants working at area businesses. Upon their release, the participants have steady employment and a brighter future. Our program not only benefits Kennebec County inmates, it benefits all 16 counties who have individuals that meet the criteria to attend C.A.R.A.

Our correctional facility also helps out our fellow counties whom have serious overcrowding issues. Overcrowding can create an unsafe working environment for the corrections officers as well as the inmates. All county correctional facilities within our state have had a dramatic increase of individuals being held on class A, B, or C crimes. The majority of crimes involve the sale of heroin or fentanyl.

Qualifying inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are considered to be a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised by our programs officers on outside projects.

The outside work crews have partnered with local municipalities providing snow removal to those individuals who are elderly or have disabilities. Programs Officer Gagnon and Matthews and their work crews raised over 10,000 pounds of produce which gleaned nearly 5,000 pounds of produce for the inmate kitchen, area food pantries, churches, homeless shelters, schools and elder programs in 2019. We would have had hundreds of pounds of cucumbers however, the deer population near the garden enjoyed their tasty goodness.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible afflicted with substance use disorder.

In 2019 we began a M.A.T. (Medical Assisted Treatment) program within the correctional facility. The facilitator of the program is ENSO Recovery. The monies for this program comes from federal grants managed by the Maine D.H.H.S. in the amount of 1.5 million dollars.

Highway fatalities and serious injury accidents continue soar as a result of individuals using electronic devices when operating a motor vehicle. Please do not be a statistic or make others a statistic because of carelessness. In 2019 Maine adopted the "Hands Free Law" not allowing operators of a motor vehicle to have an electronic device in their hand while operating.

As your Sheriff, in 2020 my focus will remain on providing professional services to the people of Kennebec, our visitors, risk management and my staff, creating a healthier, safer place to live.

Service Report – Windsor 2019

Delta Ambulance, founded in 1972, is the leading provider of high quality, compassionate emergency services and medical transportation in central Maine. Our superior training, experience and state-of-the-art medical technology sets us apart from other ambulance services.

We are pleased to be able to provide emergency Paramedic care to the people of your town and to continue supporting your First Response Rescue at no cost to your community. As a regional community based organization, we continue to fund our operations solely by reimbursement directly from the patient and the patient’s insurance. This is possible due to our economy of scale. A significant portion of our patient charges, annually, are written off as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured. Additionally, we continue to support community events throughout our coverage area.

In 2019 (January 1 – December 31), we responded to 205 911-calls. We also serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients as well as standby for fire calls.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 15.5 minutes for emergencies.

2020 has been quite eventful with the advent of the COVID-19 virus. Delta Ambulance is fully functional, operating at the Paramedic Level and has been throughout this evolving Pandemic situation. Our staff is healthy and in good spirits as we work through this challenging time. We encourage you to visit our website for more Corona virus preparedness information. Paramedic care is the highest level of Pre-Hospital care available. Our Paramedics exceed State Standards for recertification and respond with the latest medical technology available including 12 lead EKG and pharmaceutical interventions. Our care is reviewed in our Continuing Quality Improvement (CQI) program, which is recognized as a leading process in Maine.

Our support for your Rescue Services continues to include continuing medical/rescue education and on-scene replacement of medical supplies used on the call, all at no cost to the town.

Dear Residents of Windsor,

We who work at, attend, and support Erskine Academy appreciate this annual opportunity to share with you highlights from our last year and an optimistic look ahead to a promising new year and decade. Committed to providing a high-quality education to all of our learners, we put to work our core values—*Scholarship, Leadership, Stewardship, and Relationships*—to produce desirable results. We have much to celebrate about our past, be proud of at present, and look forward to in the future.

In its 137th year, Erskine Academy continued to be your high school of choice that combines an independent school education with the democratic ideal of a quality education for all. We focused our efforts on improving our school, expanding opportunities for learning in and out of the classroom, and accelerating student achievement. A few facts about Erskine Academy today attest to our vitality and value:

- With 560 students in grades nine through twelve, we are the largest town academy in Maine to serve a nearly 100% local student body on a 100% school choice basis
- A 13:1 professional teacher to student ratio
- A 98% four-year graduation rate
- A dropout rate of less than one percent
- Of 144 graduates in 2019, 85% were accepted to higher or continuing education (now a seven-year trend), many to highly selective colleges and universities
- For a fifth consecutive year, we are one of three Maine high schools to make the *Washington Post's* list of *America's Most Challenging High Schools*, a distinction based on the number of Advanced Placement courses and exams taken by our students

Having no enrollment contracts with any community for a whole or portion of their high schoolers, we operate independently and on a school choice basis exclusively. This structure provides us with stability, enables us to be nimble in our operation, and expedites problem-solving and decisionmaking while we focus on the essential processes of teaching and learning. Although independent, we commit to our publicly-funded students by admitting all students from our eight sending towns who have completed the eighth grade and can benefit from our programs. Each student and family has a choice to attend Erskine Academy or any public high schools in the region; our market share generally exceeds 60% of the students from our collective towns. To maintain this local heritage, for a tenth time, we hosted nearly 250 area sixth-graders for our “Touch of Class” program to build their familiarity with and confidence in doing high school-level work.

Regardless of differences in residence, prior learning, interests, abilities, or personal circumstances and backgrounds, here, all of our students matter and belong. All who attend here

experience a school program that blends traditional values with contemporary programs and best practices to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in our region. Each of our graduates leaves us with an academic and a personal success story to tell.

We have always considered industry certificates, two-year degrees, apprenticeships, and military service as higher education and, as such, viable pursuits. Therefore, we have created and sustained a comprehensive academic program to reflect and facilitate access to these as well as four-year degree programs. We are one of the few high schools in the state to continue to offer shop technology, family and consumer economics, and business courses for exposure and entry-level work.

Staffed by three teachers and two educational technicians, Erskine's Special Education program educates and provides specialized support to students eligible for such services through an Individual Education Plan (IEP). Valuing all students and believing they deserve a welcoming school and professional teachers who will build on their strengths, 20% of our students receive academic assistance or special education services to support their learning.

As a seven-year *MELMAC Education Foundation* school, we increased students' preparedness and aspirations for continuing their education beyond high school, reduced barriers to accessing their higher education, and significantly reduced their need to take remedial courses. Relatedly, our guidance program and personnel were recognized by the *Finance Authority of Maine (FAME)* for having 72% of graduating seniors complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which is the third-highest completion rate among the state's largest high schools (those with 100 or more seniors).

Now in its ninth year, our *Jobs for Maine Graduates (JMG)* program has increased student exposure to various forms of higher education and vocational trades programs and has taught essential work seeking, training, and employment retention skills. With 83 students pursuing a certificate in a craft or trade the Capital Area Technical Center, our enrollment there is second only to its host, Cony High School. Last year, and planned again for this spring, we produced an on-campus career fair featuring 20 local vendors, 15 skilled craftspeople, and the Army National Guard—potential employees of our graduates.

Last year, 106 students enrolled in one or more of our 12 *Advanced Placement* courses, and 421 students took at least one of our 13 dual enrollment courses with nearby colleges including Kennebec Valley Community College, Thomas College, the University of Maine, and Husson University taught here by our teachers. For their efforts in these early college experiences, nearly one-half of our graduates earned college credits while in high school, collectively saving an estimated \$525,000 in college tuition at the University of Maine rate.

Through our *International Student Program* and *American Field Service (AFS)* club, our students gain understanding and interpersonal skills for living more globally and interdependently in a culturally diverse world. For a second time, AFS students made a humanitarian trip to Guatemala to build homes for impoverished families; a ninth trip to Costa Rica to do the same is planned for this spring. Our educational travels abroad last year included Peru and Machu Picchu; students will visit Greece and Germany later this year. Eye-opening experiences such as these fire the heart and mind and inspire our students to look beyond EA and the familiar to a world that truly needs them.

With 27% of our students receiving free and reduced breakfast and lunch, our student body is socioeconomically diverse. As is the case for many Maine schools, our most significant vulnerable students are those living and learning in poverty. Inspired by twice accepting *WGME 13/Fox 23's School Spirit Challenge*, through which we raised a record-breaking 281,696 pounds of food for the Good Shepherd Food Bank of Maine and our local food pantries, we have established a school-based clothing and supplies cupboard for our members. Currently, we are instituting the "Eagles Nest," an open-access food pantry and backpack program from which students can obtain food for after school and weekends.

Other examples of our student and staff's goodwill include the sixth annual *Trunk or Treat* program that last year provided a safe observation of Halloween for a record-breaking 700 youngsters and their parents; our twelfth community *Cancer Walk* yielded \$6,700 for Maine General Medical Center's Alford Center, bringing our historical contributions to over \$50,000; we contributed thousands of hours to community service and raised substantial funds for important causes such as the Home for Little Wanderers, the Ronald McDonald House, the Center for Grieving Children, and the United Way's Day of Caring. Through our embrace of volunteerism and responsible stewardship, we engage meaningfully with our communities, and we experience giving back in appreciation and with humility.

School safety is of utmost priority, and it is among the main reasons that parents choose independent schools. This past fall we completed a second year of partnership with the *ALICE Training Institute*. *ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuation)* is an enhanced safety program comprised of proactive, age and ability appropriate, options-based strategies for use in the event of a violent intrusion on the school. Staff and student training included eLearning and advisory sessions, physical exercises, and the conducting of active-shooter drills facilitated by administrators in cooperation with officers from the Maine State Police and the Kennebec County Sheriff's Department. As a result of this training, students report feeling more confident and better equipped to respond to a significant, violent assault on themselves or their school. Subsequently, we are one of ten Maine schools to be an ALICE Certified Organization, and the only such school in Kennebec County.

Erskine Academy reflects proudly and appreciatively on its 137 years of progress and performance. Since our founding in 1883, Erskine Academy has remained true to its mission while evolving to meet new demands, challenges, and uncertainties. Because there is no limit to what we can do, pursuing excellence and implementing our mission are continuous and unyielding works in progress. This fact was affirmed recently by our school accrediting agency, *The New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)*, who in response to our Five-Year Interim Report states, "...the Commission wishes to note the level of attention which the school gives its students. You have developed a truly extensive and effective program—one that is singularly focused on students maximizing their experience and on the post-secondary experiences available to them."

We have heartfelt gratitude for our alumni and friends who believe strongly enough in our values and results that they give their time, talents, and financial donations. Their investment enables us to invest in programs and enhancements that state-set tuition alone cannot support, and raises the expectations we have for ourselves. One example of their generosity is their contribution made to last summer's complete replacement of our outdoor track, a facility to be enjoyed by our student-athletes and the community at large.

We are grateful as well to our students, families, and sending communities for their confidence in and support for Erskine Academy. Together, we create a school and legacy that adheres to what we know is right and good for our young people and aids them in constructing a strong start for adulthood.

Thank you, Windsor residents, for sustaining high school choice for your young people and families, an opportunity for learning that is available to only 3% of Maine students, despite two-thirds of Maine voters agreeing that school choice programs should be open to all. Those families who have exercised that choice to attend Erskine Academy—entrusting us with the intellectual and personal development of their children—inspire, honor, and motivate us to make an excellent school even better. In partnership and engagement with you, we look forward to new challenges and accomplishments in the year ahead.

Onward Erskine to more good things!

Superintendent and Windsor Principal Message

June 12, 2020

Dear Citizens of Windsor,

It's difficult to summarize a school year like this one because of its abrupt and unexpected closing in March. However, as we look back on the first six months of school, I'm convinced that the strong relationships Windsor staff members established with our students resulted in the best possible outcome.

Our school theme this year was, "Growing Stronger Together," and we had great momentum moving into spring. In the fall, we welcomed our first FoodCorps service member, Maggie Blumenthal, to the school. Maggie's goals for the school included teaching our students about healthy food choices, working hands-on with growing and preparing food, and building a school garden. By March, most of our middle school students were proficient in many culinary skills and all the grades had become used to trying new and interesting fruits and vegetables on a regular basis. After school closing, Maggie has continued to work with our students and staff online, and has recently finished the first stage of our school garden with ten beds and two extension gardens. We are fortunate that Maggie will be with us again next year to continue this mission.



Another exciting change at Windsor this year was the addition of middle school WIN Time. WIN stands for "What I Need," and is a forty-minute block each day in which students engage in enrichment activities or interventions for academic subjects. Some of those activities included reader's theater, home economics, working with FoodCorps, mentoring younger students, community service, learning to play cribbage, and the basics of German. We plan to continue this program, refining it each year in our efforts to help students engage in school and find outlets for their creativity and talents.

Our athletic teams had very successful seasons in the fall and winter. The girls took home the championships in cross country, soccer, and basketball! Our boys teams were competitive as well, and were the runners-up in soccer. We are proud to focus on sportsmanship and scholarship in our athletic programs at Windsor.

One of the special things about being in a pre-k to 8 school is that we can establish continuity in our teaching methods, language, and expectations. At our school assemblies, we recognize students who become millionaires (having read one million words), and many of them are fifth graders and older. However, those students' pre-k to second grade teachers are cheering just as loudly, as they taught them to read in the first place.

We were able to celebrate our students as they matured in writing as well, as many of our middle school students were recognized for their writing. Evelyn Rousseau was the runner up in the *National Earth Science Essay Contest*. Jeremy Parker won first place in the *National It's All Write Poetry/Short Story Contest*, and Aziza King and Skyler Danforth were runners up. Caleigh Crocker took third place in the *Sarah Monk Poetry Contest*. Ava Anderson won first place in the *Maine State Constitution* essay


contest, while Brady Tilton, Alyssa Trocki, and Madison McNeff were runners up. Ava Anderson also won the *If I Led My Community* essay contest. Justice Marable won first place in the *Maine Secretary of State's Native American Essay*, while Madison McNeff, Payton Cormier, and Emmett Appel were runners up. Runners up in the *Young American Poetry Contest* were Leah Booner, Heather Bourgoin, Eva Carlezon, Caleb Gay, Nathan Hall, Aiden Hastings, Aziza King, Ayla Noftall, Lucas Mitchell, Parker St. Onge, Kellsie Boynton, Elise Choate, Megan Carver, Sammi Jo Guptill, Kameron Kronillis, Mackenzie Kutniewski, Akela Mitchell, Jeremy Parker, and Reese Sullivan. Such amazing writing instruction is happening at Windsor!

I want to say a final word about our teacher's efforts during school closure. With no preparation and very little professional development time, our teachers determinedly set forth on March 17 to find ways to engage and encourage students for the last three months of school. Teachers at all levels created class pages, read to their students daily, and engaged with them virtually. They sent home learning packets designed to help the students retain their current levels while also helping parents keep their children focused. As a staff, we created videos and even found a way to have the eighth-grade promotion. We are so proud of their efforts.

It is an understatement to say that the school year didn't end in the way we planned, but it did prove that we grew stronger together.

School Budget Information: The RSU 12 School Validation Budget Referendum will follow a modified process this year. The Governor has waived the budget meeting step in the budget process, so our school budget will go straight to a referendum vote on July 14th. It is normally a two-step process involving a Districtwide Budget Validation Meeting. The RSU 12 Districtwide Budget Validation Meeting usually has approximately one hundred citizens present. One hundred people attending in a space is not allowable under current safety guidelines so the Governor has waived district budget meetings statewide. RSU 12 and the Windsor community continue to work together to provide creative and inspiring educational opportunities for our students. **The RSU 12 school budget validation referendum will take place on July 14th at your local polling place. Please remember to vote!**

GREETINGS:

In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, qualified by law to vote in Windsor affairs, to meet at the WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, in said Town of Windsor on TUESDAY, the FOURTEENTH day of JULY, 2020 A.D. at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then and there to act on Article 1 and Articles 2 are going to be voted upon at the polls by secret ballot. **The Polls shall be opened at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots will be processed at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.**

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the WINDSOR ELEMETNERY SCHOOL in said Town of Windsor on WEDNESDAY the FIFTEENTH day of JULY 2020 A.D. at 6:30 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 3 through 35 will be voted on at the open Town Meeting;

All articles being set out below to wit:

ARTICLE 1. ELECTION OF MODERATOR: To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICIALS: To elect all necessary Town of Windsor Officers/Officials by Secret Ballot.

ARTICLES 3 THROUGH 13 DEAL WITH TAX & FISCAL ADMINISTRATIONS

ARTICLE 3. TAX ADMINISTRATION: To see what method the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor will adopt for collection of taxes in FY2021.

- A. The payments, as stated on the bills, shall be due and payable on September 30, 2020 and March 31, 2021 or as otherwise approved by the Board of Selectmen because of COVID-19 (Coronavirus).
- B. The Tax Collector shall accept no advance payments, except as provided in section C below, before commitment of taxes.
- C. The Town will treat all overpayment of taxes as prepayments on next year's taxes pursuant to 36 MRSA §506 and shall pay no interest on such payments.
- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 3.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. Charge interest at the rate of 7.0 % per annum, on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2021.
- G. Administration of Tax Acquired Property:
 1. Authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of tax acquired property as they shall deem to be necessary and in the best interests of the Town, except that the Board of Selectmen shall use the special sale process required by 36 M.R.S. § 943-C for qualifying homestead property if they choose to sell it to anyone other than the former owner(s).

2. Authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver quit claim deeds, without covenant, for the conveyance of such property.
3. Give delinquent taxpayers a thirty (30) day grace period in which to buy back their property upon payment of all taxes, liens, interest, and other applicable costs.

- A. The taxpayer agrees to pay specified monthly payments to the Town based on his/her estimated and/or actual tax obligation for the current year property taxes;
- B. The Town agrees not to charge interest on timely payments made pursuant to the tax club agreement (which is the same as in Article 3 C);
- C. The Town authorizes the Tax Collector to accept tax club payments for current taxes which may be due prior to the commitment of those taxes;
- D. The agreement is automatically terminated if a scheduled payment is late, and the taxpayer then becomes subject to the same due date(s) and interest date(s) and rate as other taxpayers who are not participating in a tax club;
- E. Only taxpayers who do not have outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program; and
- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly-advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

Notice of Rabies Clinic

The Windsor Voluntary Fire Department will be sponsoring a **Rabies Clinic** at the Windsor Fire Station, 671 South Belfast Road, on **Saturday, December 5, 2020** from **12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m.** The fee is **\$10.00** per animal.

All dogs must be on a leash and all cats must be in containers. Animals should be at least four (4) months of age and not pregnant. All dog owners are reminded that **dog licenses expire at the end of each calendar year** and should be renewed at the earliest possible date.

New tags are available by the middle of October.

A rabies certificate is good for three (3) years, **(unless it's the 1st rabies shot)** and owners **must** bring a **current** certificate to the Town Clerk, as well as the **spaying/neutering certificate** if applicable, when they wish to renew their pet's license.
