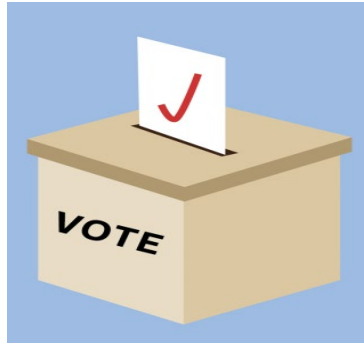

## Selectmen Letter 2023

The Select Board is pleased to report continued progress within our Town for the benefit of our citizens.

We have paved more roads in Windsor to keep them in good condition. Our road crew were very successful at keeping the roads clear throughout the winter.

The proposed budget for the coming year is presented to you in the following pages. We hope that you will review it and agree with us and the Budget Committee that while there are some increases in various areas, like you at home, we have had to face the reality of some extreme inflationary pressures. We were able to make good use of some unexpected funding this year from the State and Federal Government due to the continuing Covid pandemic. We have upgraded the communication system for the Fire Department, Public Works and Town Office and installed a stand-by generator for the communication tower. The Fire Department now has new radios that can be used when the new digital system becomes active while still allowing them to be used now. You will also see a new line item in this year's budget, Delta Ambulance will be billing us nearly \$40,000/year for their services.

We have also asked our Planning Board to work on updating the ordinances for our Town. That work has begun, and they will be holding meetings to work out details to be presented for your review and ultimately a vote probably in the fall of this year.

The re-evaluation team from KRT Appraisal have begun their work on that project and we will all be hearing from them over the next several months as they start to schedule their visits.

As always, we welcome you to our regularly scheduled meetings every other Tuesday night beginning at 6 p.m. The schedule is posted on our web site ([www.windsor.maine.gov](http://www.windsor.maine.gov)) and on the electronic sign in front of the Town Office.

# TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Over the past year we have had some changes and now that the Town Office is completely staffed, the office hours are Monday's, Thursday's, and Friday's from 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. and Tuesday's, 9:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m. without closing for lunch which allows the townspeople and the public to have full access all day to better serve you.

I am honored and truly blessed to have such devoted, dedicated and committed staff and want to thank them for their hard work and dedication to the Town of Windsor.

With having the best services for the Town of Windsor's residents we have had to face some financial challenges with inflation and rising costs in contracts/services, additional needed staff and unexpected expenses. The budget process was a difficult one but with the help and support of the Select Board Members, Budget Committee Members, Department Heads, we resulted in having a flat budget on the Town's side. You will see that we were able to increase some Revenue's and with reducing the Major Road Construction budget of \$100,000.00 this help fund the additional costs and expenses that were needed in this year's budget. One of the additional costs which you will see as a new line item within the budget is for Delta Ambulance. They have been at a "no cost" to the Town but with inflation and everything going up they are requesting a \$15.00 per capita fee which results in almost a \$40,000.00 added cost to the Town.

The Town of Windsor's Financial Condition ending June 30, 2022, was \$1,327,324.00 and is in good standing to comply with the auditor's recommendation of unexpected emergencies.

We have KRT Appraisal working within our Town for our townwide revaluation over the next year and you will be contacted by them for scheduling visits to your home. Please welcome them during this time. We have their information on our website plus any new Town updates at [www.windsor.maine.gov](http://www.windsor.maine.gov).

The ARPA Funds that we received were mostly used to upgrade the communications equipment and new radios for the Windsor Volunteer Fire Department, Windsor Rescue, Windsor Public Works, and the Town Office, plus install a generator at the communication tower on Vining Hill, and a new monitor/defibrillator for our Windsor Rescue.

Voting day will be Tuesday, June 13, 2023, from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Windsor Elementary School. DON'T FORGET TO VOTE!! ABSENTEE BALLOTS ARE NOW AVAILABLE!

The Town Meeting will be on Wednesday, June 14, 2023, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Windsor Elementary School. We hope to see you at the Town Meeting.

Remember to be kind, smile, check in on your neighbors and look out for each other. I am honored to be your Town Manager working with this Town for over the past 18 years.

## **SAFETY COMES FIRST!!**

**PLEASE be considerate when driving by any Work Zones and SLOW DOWN for flaggers and workers within the Work Zone Areas. Also, during winter hours, please SLOW DOWN and pull over when approaching a Plow Truck so they can maintain and plow safely in and around mailboxes, for the safety of everyone. THANK YOU.**

In the past year we have done Major Road Construction on the following roads per Town approval.

1. Windsor Neck Road – 0.39 miles with shim and 1.95 miles of 1 ¼" Overlay
2. Jones Road – .19 miles with shim and 1.16 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
3. Shuman Road – .17 miles with shim and 1.22 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
4. Weeks Mills Road – 1.16 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
5. Crosby Road – .49 miles with shim and 0.49 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
6. \$13,452.18 worth of road lines

In the 2023/2024 budget we are looking to work on the following roads: Vigue Road, Baker Road, Hunts Meadow Road, Melaney Road, Main Street, Ingraham Road, Weeks Mills Road (short piece) and Transfer Station Way Road. We are planning to do additional shoulder work, ditching, brush cutting and replacing culverts as needed.

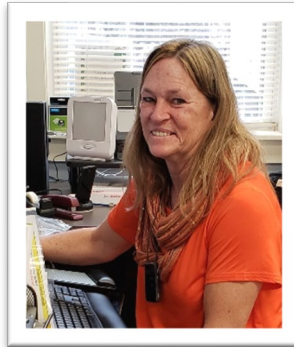

Make sure you get a copy of our Mailbox Policy which indicates the best type of mailbox to have and what height we recommend it to be. Keith would also like to thank our local contractor, Marvin Clark, for his work on our Town roads by changing cross culverts, fixing shoulders, ditching, and getting roads ready for our Major Road Construction projects.

# Town Clerk's Report

Citizens of Windsor,

It has been my pleasure to serve the residents and greater communities of Windsor. I appreciate the support of the public and collaboration with our Town Manager, Select Board, fellow colleagues, departments, board and committee members, and election personnel.

The municipal clerk's office primary responsibilities include the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from September 1995, death records beginning in 2011, and marriage records beginning January 1, 2017, are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License..... \$40.00  
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....\$15.00  
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the Clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course to purchase a Hunting license.

There were 608 dogs registered and 3 kennel licenses issued in 2022. Dogs 6 months or older that reside in Windsor for longer than 10 days. must be registered annually by December 31st.

You must have a current rabies certificate to license your dog. You will also need to provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. We now offer on-line dog licensing, through the state's website at [www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog\\_license/index.pl](http://www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl) Please be aware that you must be able to submit your current rabies vaccination to us if requested when using the on-line licensing. Per state law, a \$25 late fee applies to any dog registration as of February 1<sup>st</sup>.

Please visit our website [www.windsor.maine.gov](http://www.windsor.maine.gov) for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, tax maps, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not currently accept payment online nor by phone.

### *Registrar of Voters* Kelly McGlothlin

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. In order to vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a Driver's License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address. If you are planning to be out of town on Election Day, you may request an absentee ballot. The request must be made at least three business days prior to voting day unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 30 days prior to an election.

Our polling place has been changed from the Windsor Town Hall to the Windsor School Gym, 366 Ridge Road, Windsor ME.

Currently there are 1,981 Registered Voters in Windsor. There are 433 Democrat, 807 Republican, 115 Green Independent, and 621 Unenrolled voters.

Whether you were a moderator, warden, ballot clerk, election clerk, deputy registrar, or even simply someone helping set up booths, I really appreciate all you have done and are willing to do to help make our elections run as smoothly as possible. Thank you!

\* The \$25 late fee for dog licenses applied for after January 31<sup>st</sup> is imposed by the State statute, and nothing in the law vests any discretion in a municipal clerk or any other official to waive this fee (*see 7 M.R.S.A. § 3923-A(4)*) The late fee is in addition to the annual license fee before any license applied for after January 31<sup>st</sup> can be issued.

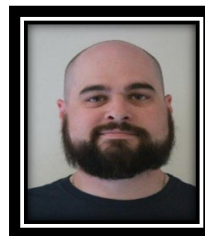
**PLEASE NOTE:**

- Your dog reaches the age of 6 months.
- You become the owner or keeper of a dog aged 6 months or more.

Tags are available after October 15<sup>th</sup> and **must** be purchased **by** December 31<sup>st</sup>.

### **This is the past work for 2022:**

- The painting of the Resthaven fence has been completed by volunteers and Sean Teekema oversaw the work of several volunteers from high school and members of the community.

## 2023 Assessors' Agent Report

There are several programs available to assist property tax owners in Maine. The Maine Homestead Exemption allows for a reduction in the assessed value and is probably the largest exemption program. To qualify, you must be a legal resident of the State of Maine, have owned a residential property in Maine for at least the past twelve months as of April 1 and the homestead must be your permanent place of residence. You can only claim the exemption for one property in Maine and cannot claim a similar exemption in any other state. Applications for this program are available at the Town Office and must be filed by April 1. Once your application has been approved, it is automatically renewed each year that you qualify for the exemption. When a property is sold, the exemption is removed and the new homeowner must apply for the exemption.

Forms are also available at the Town Office for a Veteran Exemption for all veterans who served during a recognized war period and is 62 years or older; or, is receiving 100% disability as a Veteran; or, became 100% disabled while serving. The Veteran exemption is also available for the widow, widower, minor child or widowed parent of a veteran. An important change was made to the Veteran's Exemption eligibility. The law eliminated the requirement that a veteran of the Vietnam War must have served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days. If you are a veteran of the Vietnam War who would otherwise qualify for the exemption in the past but did not because of the 180 days of service requirement, this change would allow you to apply for the Veteran Exemption. Like the homestead exemption, once this is approved it will automatically be renewed each year that you are eligible.

The State Property Tax Deferral Program is a loan program that can cover the annual property tax bills of Maine people who are ages 65 and older or are permanently disabled and who cannot afford to pay them on their own. The program allows certain individuals to defer (postpone) payment of the property taxes on their homesteads until they pass away, move, or sell their property. During the period when the taxes are being deferred, the State reimburses the municipality for the deferred taxes. The deferred tax, plus interest, is then required to be repaid to the State by the individual or their estate when they pass away, move, sell the property, or move the property (if mobile or floating home) out of Maine. To be eligible for the program, you must be at least 65 years old or unable to work due to a disability. In addition, you must have income of less than \$40,000 and liquid assets of less than \$50,000 (or \$75,000 if filing a joint application). To be eligible for the program you must own and occupy the property as your principal residence, and you must be receiving a homestead exemption on the property. A handout of frequently asked questions (FAQ) that explains the program in more detail and lists additional restrictions is available at the town office. The FAQ and an application can also be found at <https://www.maine.gov/revenue/taxes/tax-relief-credits-programs/property-tax-relief-programs/deferral-program>

Last year the Maine Legislature approved Property Tax Stabilization for Senior Citizens. This is a State program that allows certain senior-citizen residents to stabilize, or freeze, the property taxes on their homestead. If you qualify and file a timely application each year, the tax billed to you for your homestead will be frozen at the amount you were billed in the prior tax year. Next year's application will be available in August, 2023. 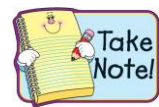

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Town of Windsor, Maine's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

**Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements**

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but it is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or

in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, I:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Town of Windsor, Maine's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in my judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Town of Windsor, Maine's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

I am required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that I identified during the audit.

#### **Required Supplementary Information**

Management has omitted Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. My opinions on the basic financial statements are not affected by this missing information.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to my inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

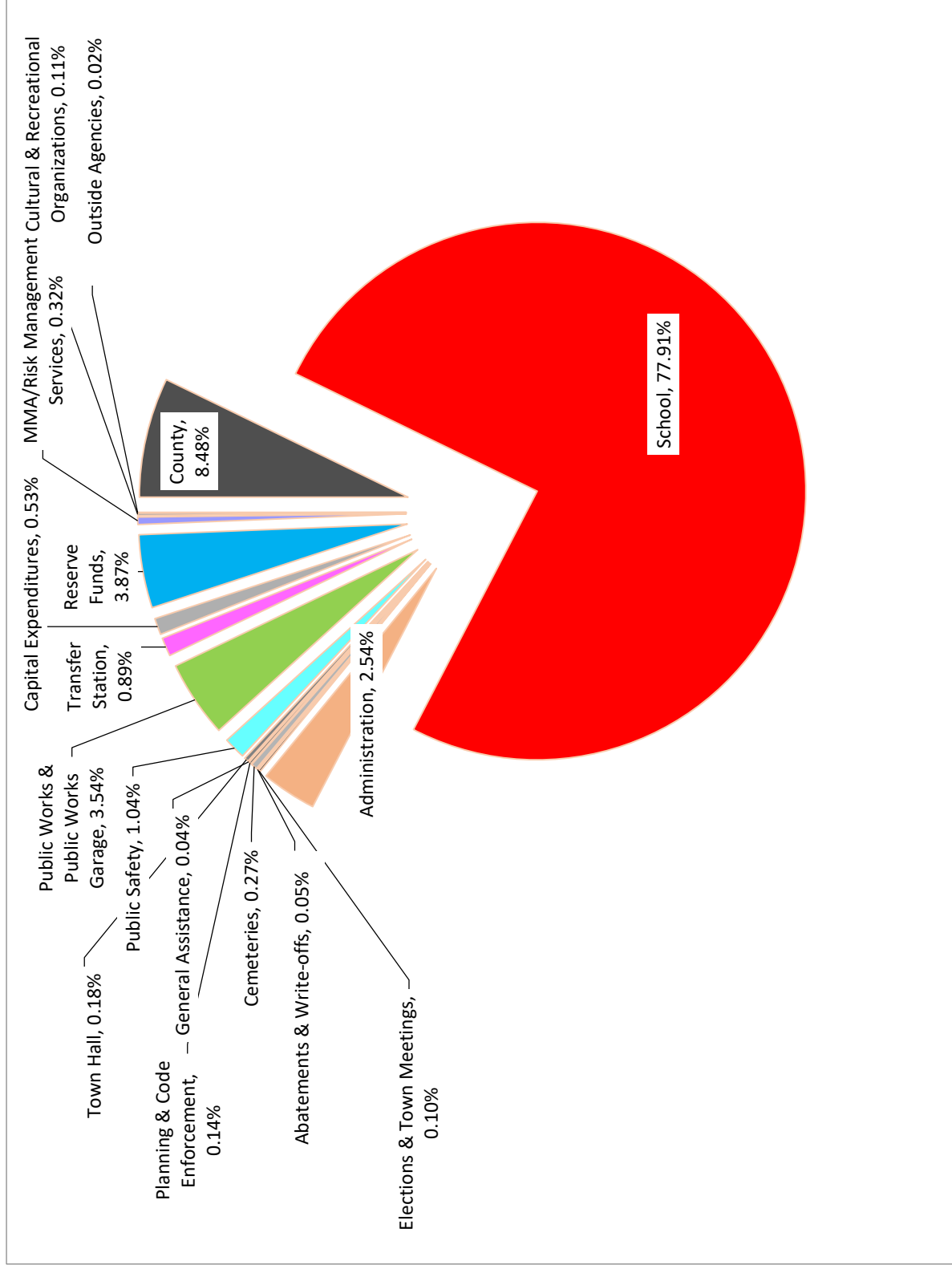

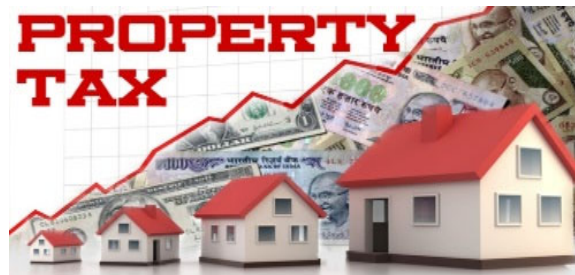

I hope this letter finds you well. It is my honor and privilege to serve the people of Maine's First District in Washington, DC, and I appreciate the opportunity to share this annual update with you.

This past year, our state faced unprecedented challenges, mirroring the difficulties experienced by communities across the nation. High inflation rates, a rapidly changing climate, aging infrastructure, and increasing energy costs were among the top concerns I heard while home in the district. Keeping these in mind, I was proud to work with my colleagues in the Maine Delegation to pass historic legislation to bring federal dollars back to our communities.

One of the ways we delivered for Mainers was through the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) in August. This law provides much-needed assistance to struggling families. With the help of the IRA, Americans will save an average of \$800 per year on health insurance and Medicare beneficiaries will have increased access to medication.

Additionally, the IRA offers billions of dollars to expand rebate programs for Americans who wish to make their homes more energy efficient. Homeowners can now receive up to a 30 percent tax incentive for the cost of home solar installations and a 30 percent incentive when investing in a heat pump. Over the next decade, these rebates will offer Mainers thousands of dollars in savings while decreasing fuel costs for winters to come.

In 2022, Congress also passed meaningful legislation to help create skilled jobs in the construction, manufacturing, and engineering sectors. The Creating Helpful Incentives to Produce Semiconductors (CHIPS) Act will allow the U.S. to advance its leadership in the development of semiconductors used in the manufacturing of computers, cell phones, cars, and numerous other technologies we rely on. By developing this industry at home, we can bolster our national security and lessen our reliance on foreign technology.

As I look toward this Congress, I am excited to work with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to improve the lives of Maine people. It is critically important that we continue to take action to increase job growth, decrease inflation, take measures to promote our national security and invest in our health care and education systems.

Each year my office receives over 40,000 calls, letters, and emails from Mainers. I recognize the tremendous trust you place in having me represent you in Washington and by sharing your stories, thoughts, and concerns. Please rest assured, I will continue to fight for the interests of Mainers in Congress, and my staff and I will do everything we can to ensure your needs are met.

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. If I may be of assistance to you in any way, I encourage you to contact one of my six state offices.

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21<sup>st</sup> century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.


Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2022. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Correctional Services, Civil Process, Court and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) and a School Resource Officer for MSAD 49.

While the severity of the pandemic is decreasing, my office shall remain vigilant. We will monitor for potential virus recurrence in our correctional facility and take all recommended precautions to reduce any impact that may threaten those in our custody.

In 2022, Law Enforcement Deputies again logged thousands of calls for service. Our calls for service have increased since 2021. Our geographic patrol responsibilities within the County have increased, as the state police have opted to reduce their rural patrol coverage.

Overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances continue to plague our country. My staff responded to 20 overdoses in 2022, we were able to save 11 lives. This number does not include the saves by jail staff in 2022. As the disorder continues to increase, I wish to make it clear that we at the Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

The patrol division welcomes Sean Dixon and Eric Thiess to our team. Deputy Dixon has 12 years of full-time experience working as a law enforcement officer. Deputy Thiess came to us from our correctional division. Deputy Thiess is currently at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy attending the 18-week program to become a certified law enforcement officer.

My agency continues to receive federal funds to conduct patrol details specifically related to motor vehicle violations throughout the county. Kennebec County Deputies continue to excel statistically for the number of interdictions for drug related criminal activities.

Through the federal grants system, we were able to purchase a Can-Am UTV and trailer to assist us with our duties serving all of Kennebec County. This tool is available to any municipality or law enforcement agency within the county.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2022, the three civil deputies received over 7,441 requests for service in Kennebec County. This is an increase from 2021 by over 300 services. Some of the services include civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

We welcome any questions regarding civil service to be made to the office. Kennebec is very lucky to have Chief Civil Deputy Harry McKenney, who just happens to be the go-to guy on civil service matters statewide. Keep up good work Chief!

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 1810 inmate intakes. This is an increase from 2022. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Trespass to Homicide.

Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. We have improved our medical and mental health services at Kennebec to help manage the needs of those incarcerated.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the county, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

The big news for my staff in 2022 was the purchase of 73 Winthrop Street in Augusta. This building will house the entire sheriff's office divisions which include administration, patrol, detectives and the civil division. Our mailing address will remain the same. More information on the move to follow within the next couple of months. Me and my staff are very excited to move into a larger and much newer building that we can call our own.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2023, I remain committed to serving the hard-working taxpayers of this county, their families and our visitors, honorably, professionally, and by using good common sense and judgement.

**Service Report – Windsor 2022**

Delta Ambulance, founded in 1972, is the leading provider of high quality, compassionate emergency services and medical transportation in central Maine. Our superior training, experience and state-of-the-art medical technology sets us apart from other ambulance services.

We are pleased to be able to provide emergency Paramedic care to the people of Windsor and to continue supporting your First Response Rescue. A significant portion of our patient charges, annually, are written off as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured. Additionally, we continue to support community events throughout our coverage area.

According to Maine state data, in 2022 (January 1 – December 31), we responded to over 14,000 911-calls, 212 of which were in Windsor. Additionally, we serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients as well as standby for fire calls.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 12.7 minutes for emergencies.

Paramedic care is the highest level of Pre-Hospital care available. Our Paramedics exceed State Standards for recertification and respond with the latest medical technology available including 12-lead EKG and pharmaceutical interventions. Our care is reviewed in our Continuing Quality Improvement (CQI) program which is recognized as a leading process in Maine.

Our support for your Rescue Services continues to include continuing medical/rescue education and on-scene replacement of medical supplies used on the call, all at no additional cost to the town.

Delta Ambulance is committed providing the highest quality emergency medical services to the communities we serve - safely and effectively. This is Delta’s number one priority and we are prepared and proud to serve you as your trusted emergency medical service provider.

Dear Residents of Windsor,

Erskine Academy hoped for a safer, healthier, and brighter 2022; we were not disappointed. This school year feels more hopeful and normal than the previous two, with the day-to-day challenges of mitigating the effects of the COVID pandemic receding. With this appreciated respite, Erskine Academy has focused on student safety, achievement, and socioemotional development. Key to these efforts has been building and leveraging relationships with students, families, and our communities—our most promising antidote for trauma and crisis and our best prognosis for recovery, renewal, and revitalization.

In the unprecedented past year, the EA community balanced significant challenges with our commitment to our mission, values, and each others' well-being. This report reflects our unstoppable dedication to teaching, learning, and school life. Our response to the pandemic and the lessons learned have strengthened our resolve to emerge a stronger and better Erskine Academy.

Despite recent challenges, an education fit for the times but steeped in traditional values can always be had here at Erskine Academy. Our current enrollment, approximating 63% of the secondary students from our collective eight sending towns, and a 150-member class of 2026, our largest class in recent history, indicate that our program is broadly desired and consumed by our constituents. Accordingly, we pledge our resources—town-paid tuition, private tuition, and gifts from our alumni and friends—to provide the conditions and educational experiences to inspire our students to their highest potential in school, at work, and within their communities.

Having no enrollment contracts with any community for the whole or a portion of its high schoolers, all students attend here on a voluntary, school-choice basis. This structure enables us to be nimble in our operation and business dealings and expedites problem-solving and decision-making. As we focus on essential teaching and learning processes, we are directly accountable to our students and families, who can leave us for any public high school in the area that may better meet their needs. There is no better system of accountability than the market-style kind that comes from giving parents the freedom to choose schools.

In Erskine Academy's 140<sup>th</sup> year, we continue to be a high school of choice that combines an independent education with the democratic ideal of a quality education for all. Our core values—***Scholarship, Leadership, Stewardship, and Relationships***—are at work to produce results and deliver the highest educational experience possible. A few facts about Erskine Academy today attest to its vitality and value:

- With 573 students in grades nine through twelve, we are the largest town academy in Maine to serve a nearly 100% local student body on a 100% school choice basis
- A 13:1 professional student-to-teacher ratio
- A 100% graduation rate; a 98% four-year graduation rate for 2022
- A dropout rate of less than one percent
- Of 108 graduates in 2022, 70% were accepted to higher or continuing education, many to highly selective colleges and universities

Although independent, we commit to our publicly-funded students by admitting all students from our eight sending towns who have completed the eighth grade and can benefit from our existing programs.

Regardless of differences in residence, prior learning, interests, abilities, or personal circumstances and backgrounds, all of our students matter and belong. All who attend here experience a school program that blends traditional values with contemporary programs and best practices to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in our region.



Last year, 152 students enrolled in one or more of nine **Advanced Placement** courses available on an open-enrollment basis; 251 enrolled across our twelve **Dual Enrollment** courses with nearby colleges and universities, taught here by our teachers. Participants in these programs are more likely to enroll in college directly after high school; earn better grades once there; have academic momentum to stay in college and finish; and save dollars spent on college credits. For their efforts in these early college experiences, nearly one-half of our graduates annually earn college credits while in high school; many enter college as second-semester freshmen. From 2018 to the present, Erskine Academy students received college credit for 1281 courses and realized substantial savings in college tuition.

Industry certificates, two-year degrees, apprenticeships, and military service are considered higher education and, as such, viable pursuits. Therefore, we have created and sustained a comprehensive academic program to reflect and facilitate access to these experiences, as well as four-year degree programs. We are one of few high schools in the state to continue to offer shop technology, family and consumer economics, culinary arts, and business courses for exposure and entry-level work. With 66 students pursuing a certificate in a craft or trade at the **Capital Area Technical Center** in Augusta, Erskine's robust enrollment at CATC is consistently second only to its host, Cony High School.

Staffed by three teachers and two educational technicians, Erskine's **Special Education** program educates and provides specialized support to students eligible for such services through an Individual Education Plan (IEP). Valuing all students and believing they deserve a welcoming school and professional teachers who will build on their strengths, 35% of our students receive specialized **Academic Assistance** or special education services to support their learning.

Now in its eleventh year, our **Jobs for Maine Graduates (JMG)** program has increased student exposure to various forms of higher education and vocational trades programs and has taught essential work-seeking, training, and employment retention skills to those who experience barriers to their learning that are outside of their responsibility.

Having completed an eight-year round as a **MELMAC Education Foundation** school in 2020, we were recently selected for a second round. As a MELMAC school, we increased students' preparedness and aspirations for continuing their education beyond high school, reduced barriers to accessing their higher education, and significantly reduced their need to take remedial courses once in college. In this second iteration with MELMAC, we will implement programming to boost students' readiness for college learning and careers.

In 2022, we became a New York Life's "**Grief-Sensitive School**" to receive staff training to increase and enhance our ability to care for grieving students.

In response to national mass shootings and with school safety our top priority, we recently conducted a third round of schoolwide training in **ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate)**, an enhanced safety program of age and ability-appropriate options-based strategies to use in the event of a violent intrusion on the school. Staff and student training included eLearning and advisory sessions, physical exercises, and the conducting of active-shooter drills facilitated by administrators and officers from the Maine State Police and the Kennebec County Sheriff's Department. Students report feeling more confident and better equipped to respond to a significant violent assault on themselves or their school due to this training.

With 27% of our students receiving free or reduced breakfast and lunch, our student body is socioeconomically diverse. We are fortunate this year and last to be included in the Maine Department of Education's **Universal Meals Program**, providing all publicly-supported students with tray breakfasts and lunches daily and at no cost to them. However, because our most vulnerable students live and learn in poverty, we continue to operate a school-based clothing and supplies closet and the **Eagles Nest**, an in-school, open-access food pantry and backpack program from which students can obtain food for after school and on weekends.

Erskine Academy students continue to benefit from the best traditions of small-town schools: individualized attention, respect for diversity, a strong cooperative spirit, and numerous opportunities for leadership and service. The wide range of activities pursued by our students and staff is testimony to the vibrancy of the school community.

With COVID occupying less bandwidth in our program, we produced our most favored traditions and activities, such as **Homecoming**, **Winter Carnival**, and an in-person **Senior Week** of activities (including Baccalaureate, Class Night, and graduation).

Even in a prolonged pandemic, our students have done a great deal of good, contributing thousands of hours of community service and raising similar in funds to aid those in need nearby and as far as Central America. Beneficiaries of our school community's goodwill include causes and programs like the Home for Little Wanderers, the United Way's Day of Caring, and local families with significant medical needs. A 13th Annual Cancer Walk, with nearly 100% of our students participating, culminated in raising an aggregated donation exceeding \$50,000 for the Alford Center for Cancer Care. And in the spring of 2023, after a three-year hiatus, some students will travel abroad to Germany, while others will journey to Costa Rica on a humanitarian trip (our eleventh) to build homes in an impoverished village. By embracing volunteerism and stewardship, we engage meaningfully with our communities and experience giving back with appreciation and humility.

Since our founding in 1883, Erskine Academy has remained true to its mission while evolving to meet new demands, challenges, and uncertainties. Because there is no limit to what we can do, pursuing excellence and implementing our mission are continuous and unyielding works in progress. Our school accrediting agency, **The New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)**, affirmed this in its response to our most recent Five-Year Interim Report: "...the Commission wishes to note the level of attention which the school gives its students. You have developed a truly extensive and effective program—one that is singularly focused on students maximizing their experience and on the post-secondary experiences available to them."

We have heartfelt gratitude for our alumni and friends who believe strongly enough in our values and results that they give their time, talents, and financial donations. Their investment enables us to provide programs and enhancements that state-set tuition alone cannot support and raises our expectations for ourselves.

We are grateful to our students, families, and sending communities for their confidence in and support for Erskine Academy. Together, we create a school and legacy that adheres to what we know is right and good for our young people and aids them in constructing a strong start for adulthood.

Thank you, Windsor residents, for sustaining high school choice for your young people and families, a provision that is envied by many and available to only about 3% of Maine students. Those families who have chosen Erskine Academy—entrusting us with their children's intellectual, social, and personal development—inspire, honor, and motivate us to make an excellent school even better. In partnership and engagement with you, we look forward to new opportunities and accomplishments in the year ahead.

We have much to celebrate about our past, be proud of at present, and look forward to in the future. In a post-pandemic world such as this, you are succeeding if you are moving onward.

## Information from RSU 12 and Windsor Elementary School

May 8, 2023



Dear Citizens of Windsor,

The Sheepsfoot Valley RSU 12 School District is pleased to report that the 2022-2023 academic year to date has been a success for our students, staff, and community. With the dedicated efforts of our educators, staff, and the RSU 12 Board of Directors, we have continued to focus on our vision of "Building a foundation of lifetime learning for our students, families, and communities by inspiring growth, change, and success for all students."

We are grateful for the contributions of our Windsor school board members, Monique Crummett, Ed Pollard, and Dustin Mellor, who have been instrumental in shaping the progress we have made in RSU 12. Ms. Crummett is a member of the Policy Committee and the Anti-bullying Committee, and Mr. Mellor is the RSU 12 representative to the Capital Area Technical Center Board. Windsor school board members have shown a deep commitment to the education of our students and have devoted many hours of volunteer time to the students and citizens of Windsor.

The school year at Windsor Elementary School has been full of exciting events. During the fall, the school was awarded a grant for a 12-tree fruit orchard, which was planted by our students with the help of ReTreeUs near the playground. Additionally, an outdoor classroom is expected to be finished by the end of the school year, thanks to the hard work of CATC students.

Our middle school is proud to be ranked among the top twenty middle schools in Maine. This is a testament to the hard work of our students and teachers, as well as the strong foundation they receive in the lower grades. Currently, we have 282 students enrolled in grades kindergarten through 8th grade. We are excitedly preparing for end-of-year field trips and celebrations.

As a reminder, we are pleased to report that we continue to provide five PreK classrooms throughout the district. Windsor PreK students typically attend classes at the Somerville Elementary School. We offer transportation and five full school days a week of PreK education. We are currently accepting registrations for the 2023-2024 school year, and we encourage interested families to contact the RSU 12 Central Office about how to register.

As we look ahead to the 2023-2024 academic year, we are in the process of finalizing the RSU 12 school budget with the citizens of RSU 12. The proposed RSU 12 school budget for the 2023-2024 academic year is \$26,400,098.68, representing an increase of 3.1%. This increase is mainly due to inflation, energy costs, and a dramatic increase in high school tuition costs. Despite continued challenges with the state subsidy calculation for education and a 6.5% increase in the maximum allowable tuition rate, which dictates school choice tuition costs for high school, the RSU 12 Board of Directors is committed to developing a budget that supports our students while remaining fiscally conservative and maintaining Grades 9-12 school choice options. We encourage our community to learn more about our schools and our budget process through our website at [www.svrsu.org](http://www.svrsu.org).

In conclusion, we are proud of our progress in RSU 12 and look forward to continuing our work with the Windsor community to provide inspiring educational opportunities for our students. We encourage community members to attend the **RSU 12 District Budget Meeting on May 24th at 6:30 pm at Chelsea Elementary School** and support our students in their educational journey.

In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, qualified by law to vote in Windsor affairs, to meet at the **WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL**, in said Town of Windsor on **TUESDAY**, the **THIRTEENTH** day of **JUNE, 2023** A.D. at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then and there to act on Article 1 and Articles 2 are going to be voted upon at the polls by secret ballot. **The Polls shall be opened at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots will be processed at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.**

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the **WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL** in said Town of Windsor on **WEDNESDAY** the **FOURTEENTH** day of **JUNE, 2023** A.D. at 6:30 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 3 through 34 will be voted on at the open Town Meeting.

All articles being set out below to wit:

**ARTICLE 1. ELECTION OF MODERATOR:** To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

**ARTICLE 2. ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICIALS:** To elect all necessary Town of Windsor Officers/Officials by Secret Ballot.

**ARTICLES 3 THROUGH 13 DEAL WITH TAX & FISCAL ADMINISTRATIONS**

**ARTICLE 3. TAX ADMINISTRATION:** To see what method the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor will adopt for collection of taxes in FY2024.

- A. The payments, as stated on the bills, shall be due and payable on September 30, 2023, and March 31, 2024, or as otherwise approved by the Select Board.
- B. The Tax Collector shall accept no advance payments, except as provided in section C below before commitment of taxes.
- C. The Town will treat all overpayment of taxes as prepayments on next year's taxes pursuant to 36 MRSA §506 and shall pay no interest on such payments.
- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 3.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. Charge interest at the rate of 7.0 % per annum on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2023.
- G. Administration of Tax Acquired Property:
  - 1. Authorize the Select Board to dispose of tax acquired property as they shall deem to be necessary and in the best interests of the Town, except that the Select Board shall use the special sale process

required by 36 M.R.S. § 943-C for qualifying homestead property if they choose to sell it to anyone other than the former owner(s).

2. Authorize the Select Board to execute and deliver quit claim deeds, without covenant, for the conveyance of such property.
3. Give delinquent taxpayers a thirty (30) day grace period in which to buy back their property upon payment of all taxes, liens, interest, and other applicable costs.

- C. The Town authorizes the Tax Collector to accept tax club payments for current taxes which may be due prior to the commitment of those taxes.
- D. The agreement is automatically terminated if a scheduled payment is late, and the taxpayer then becomes subject to the same due date(s) and interest date(s) and rate as other taxpayers who are not participating in a tax club.
- E. Only taxpayers who do not have outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program.
- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

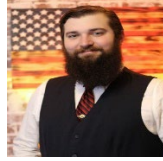
