(1923-2023)



In honor of a life deeply cherished and well-lived, we dedicate this year's Windsor Town Report to the memory of Elwin F. Hussey. A pillar of our community, Elwin's legacy is woven into the very fabric of Windsor's history.

Windsor Select Board Report 2024

There were some major changes to the Select Board this year. Two of our longtime members “retired”, Ronald F. Brann and Richard H. Gray Jr. both chose not to run for re-election.

We have two new members (Chester D. Barnes Jr. and Thomas McNaughton) each brings both new ideas and talents to the Select Board.

We also experienced the losses of our Auditor, who passed away, and our Assessor who will be retiring in June 2024. We have had to seek replacements for these two important positions, which turned out to be far more difficult than you might believe.

The Town voted to institute a new Site Plan Review Ordinance last fall to set some standards for Commercial Development. The Planning Board has also been working on updates to other Ordinances for our Town.

The re-evaluation team (KRT Appraisal) will be finished with their work this summer. We will be able to set a new mil rate in August.

As always, we welcome you to our regularly scheduled Select Board Meetings every other Tuesday night. The schedule is posted on our website (www.windsor.maine.gov) and on the electronic sign in front of the Town Office.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

I am truly blessed to have served this Town over the past 19 years. Things have changed over the years, and we have so many things to be thankful for. The staff continue to amaze me with their hard work, commitment, and dedication as they take pride in what they do for the Town and the residents, from the Main Office with their warm welcome, helpfulness, and smile, to the friendly Transfer Station helpers and the hard-working Public Works crew keeping our roads safe. The Town has gone from some of the worst roads in the surrounding Town's to some of the best roads and we have established a road schedule that has been something to be proud of. The municipal employees work very hard in providing the best services the taxpayers expect.

The budget process has been challenging with the constraints from the unfunded State mandates, inflation, rising costs in contract/services, RSU #12 school expenses and loss of Revenue which all directly impacts our local mill rate/taxes we pay to keep the Town running. The Select Board Members, Budget Committee Members, Department Heads, and I are looking into different and creative ways to better serve the residents of the Town of Windsor.

The Town of Windsor's long-time Auditor, Keel Hood passed away last August (he will be sadly missed by all of us), and we had to seek a new auditing firm. We have since hired RHR Smith & Co. and they are working on the June 30, 2023, audit. Once this audit is completed, we will post this on the Town's website (www.windsor.maine.gov).

KRT Appraisal has been working on the townwide revaluation over the past year and will be finalizing this summer. Impact notices will be sent to the residents before the new tax commitment.

Voting day will be Tuesday, June 11, 2024, from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Windsor Elementary School. DON'T FORGET TO VOTE! ABSENTEE BALLOTS ARE NOW AVAILABLE!

The Town Meeting will be on Wednesday, June 12, 2024, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Windsor Elementary School. We hope to see you at the Town Meeting.

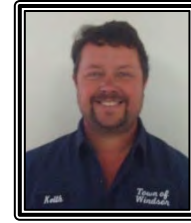

PLEASE be considerate when driving by any Work Zones and **SLOW DOWN** for flaggers and workers within the Work Zone Areas. In the past year we have done Major Road Construction on the following roads per Town approval.

1. Vigue Road – 0.23 miles with 1 ¼” Overlay
2. Baker Road – 0.4 miles with some ¾” shim and 1 ¼” Overlay
3. Hunts Meadow Road – 0.88 miles with some ¾” shim and 1 ¼” Overlay
4. Melaney Road – 0.25 miles some ¾” shim and 1 ¼” Overlay
5. Main Street – 0.08 miles with 1 ¼” Overlay
6. Ingraham Road – 0.23 miles with 1 ¼” Overlay
7. Weeks Mills Road – 0.4 miles with ¾” shim and 1 ¼” Overlay
8. Transfer Station Way Road – 0.09 miles Grind and Reclaim and 1 ¼” Overlay
9. \$10,972.08 worth of striping road lines
10. \$10,000.00 worth of crack sealing

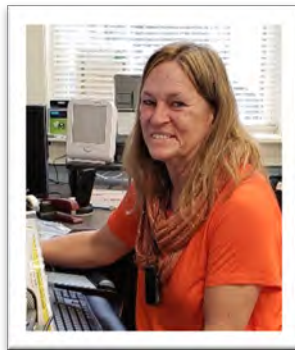
The Road Supervisor (Keith Hall) would like to thank Tim Coston, Dan Gerrard and back-up plow drivers Jimmy Page and Greg Feltis for doing a wonderful job this winter. Keith would also like to thank Brian Swift for his plowing as a hired driver from McGee Construction and would also like to thank McGee Construction for helping cover our routes when our Plow Truck was down. Summer of 2024 we will be finishing Vigue Road and fix damage on Baker Road. We will be looking to pave the Reed Road from Route 105 to Route 32 and all other roads that were going to be paved are still in decent shape, so we are going to skip them this year. We will be working with Marvin Clark to change a 5’ pipe on Coopers Mills Road and fix shoulders. We will still be doing additional shoulder work, ditching, brush cutting, crack sealing, striping road lines and replacing driveway culverts as needed.

Town Clerk's Report

Residents of Windsor,

It has been my pleasure to serve the residents and greater communities of Windsor. I appreciate the support of the public and collaboration with our Town Manager, Select Board, fellow colleagues, departments, board and committee members, and election personnel.

The municipal clerk's office primary responsibilities include the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from September 1995, death records beginning in 2011, and marriage records beginning January 1, 2017 are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License.....	\$40.00
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....	\$15.00
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....	\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the Clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course to purchase a Hunting license.

There were 609 dogs registered and 3 kennel licenses issued in 2023. Dogs 6 months or older that reside in Windsor for longer than 10 days must be registered annually by December 31st. You must have a current rabies certificate to license your dog. You will also need to

provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. We now offer on-line dog licensing, through the state's website at www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl Please be aware that you must be able to submit your current rabies vaccination to us if requested when using the on-line licensing. Per state law, a \$25 late fee applies to any dog registration as of February 1st.

Please visit our website www.windsor.maine.gov for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, tax maps, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not currently accept payment online nor by phone.

REGISTRAR OF VOTERS

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. In order to vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a Driver’s License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address. If you are planning to be out of town on Election Day, you may request an absentee ballot. The request must be made at least three business days prior to voting day, unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 30 days prior to an election

Our polling place has been changed from the Windsor Town Hall to the Windsor School Gym, 366 Ridge Road, Windsor ME.

As of 12/31/23 there were 2,005 Registered Voters in Windsor. There are 433 Democrat, 812 Republican, 118 Green Independent, 14 Libertarian and 628 Unenrolled voters.

Whether you were a moderator, warden, ballot clerk, election clerk, deputy registrar, or even simply someone helping set up booths, I really appreciate all you have done and are willing to do to help make our elections run as smoothly as possible. Thank you!

This year the Animal Control Officer's handled 55 animal issues for the Town of Windsor, which included the following:

- 13 Cats to Shelter in Augusta
- 5 Dogs to Shelter in Augusta & Dogs at Large
- 25 License Necessary & No Court Summons
- 0 Dog Bites
- 0 Animal Trespass (including one livestock trespass)
- 3 Kennel Inspection
- 9 Cruelty & Animal Welfare Checks
- 0 Cats – Deceased
- 0 General Cat Complaints



It is the ***LAW** to license your dog/s **every** year!

* The \$25 late fee for dog licenses applied after January 31st is imposed by the State statute, and nothing in the law vests any discretion in a municipal clerk or any other official to waive this fee (*see 7 M.R.S.A. § 3923-A(4)*) The late fee is in addition to the annual license fee before any license applied for after January 31st can be issued.

PLEASE NOTE:

You are responsible to obtain a license within 10 days after:

- Your dog reaches the age of 6 months.
- You become the owner or keeper of a dog aged 6 months or more.
- You move to a new community. (License transfer fee is \$1.00)

*** Proper ID can prevent your dog from going to the shelter – please keep your dog tags on their collars!**

October 15th and
must be purchased **by**

Enhanced 9-1-1 Addressing

Dear Windsor Residents,

In 1988, Maine residents approved the statewide deployment of Enhanced 9-1-1 service. This not only improved the emergency communication system, but it also automatically displayed the address of a caller at an emergency call answering center. Having a properly marked address within the Enhanced 9-1-1 system with a caller that were to be hysterical, loses consciousness or hangs up, the dispatch center will know where to send help. This system is also beneficial to those who do not speak English, or to those who are unfamiliar with the Town of Windsor such as an out-of-state visitor.

In 1994, the Emergency Services Communications Bureau was created within the Maine Department of Public Safety. This department was created to oversee the development and implantation of statewide Enhanced 9-1-1 service. On June 19, 1995, the residents of Windsor voted to adopt and adhere to the Enhanced 9-1-1 Addressing ordinance.

Since December 5, 2023, the Town of Windsor has begun to update and correct the addresses found within the town of Windsor to adhere to the Enhanced 9-1-1 Addressing Ordinance. Some residents may have already experienced a change to their physical address. The Town of Windsor is appreciative to the understanding and cooperation of those residents who may already have already been affected by the update.

As we continue to update any addresses that are not in compliance with the Enhanced 9-1-1 Ordinance for the Town of Windsor, we understand this to be an inconvenience. Nevertheless, there is a standing order in place we must adhere to; with the life safety and delivery of emergency services to our residents and visitors being our main priority. These numerical addresses need to match that of the Enhanced 9-1-1 system to assure the most prompt and efficient response possible of emergency services to all our residents and visitors.

Windsor Rescue continues to be an active unit, with a very devoted crew. We continue to keep our EMS level updated with our monthly continuing education classes; our equipment continues to be keep updated as well as knowledge base of our equipment.

We are in hopes of adding an Automated Chest Compressor unit this year that will help during sudden death situations and will allow us to give more effective CPR, this unit is in excess of \$22,000 dollars.

2024 Assessors' Agent Report

There are several programs available to assist property tax owners in Maine. The Maine Homestead Exemption allows for a reduction in the assessed value and is probably the largest exemption program. To qualify, you must be a legal resident of the State of Maine, have owned a residential property in Maine for at least the past twelve months as of April 1 and the homestead must be your permanent place of residence. You can only claim the exemption for one property in Maine and cannot claim a similar exemption in any other state. Applications for this program are available at the Town Office and must be filed by April 1. Once your application has been approved, it is automatically renewed each year that you qualify for the exemption. When a property is sold, the exemption is removed and the new homeowner must apply for the exemption.

Forms are also available at the Town Office for a Veteran Exemption for all veterans who served during a recognized war period and is 62 years or older; or, is receiving 100% disability as a Veteran; or, became 100% disabled while serving. The Veteran exemption is also available for the widow, widower, minor child or widowed parent of a veteran. An important change was made to the Veteran's Exemption eligibility. The law eliminated the requirement that a veteran of the Vietnam War must have served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days. If you are a veteran of the Vietnam War who would otherwise qualify for the exemption in the past but did not because of the 180 days of service requirement, this change would allow you to apply for the Veteran Exemption. Like the homestead exemption, once this is approved it will automatically be renewed each year that you are eligible.

The State Property Tax Deferral Program is a loan program that can cover the annual property tax bills of Maine people who are ages 65 and older or are permanently disabled and who cannot afford to pay them on their own. The State Property Tax Deferral Program is a lifeline loan program that can cover the annual property tax bills of Maine people who are ages 65 and older or are permanently disabled and who cannot afford to pay them on their own. The loan program allows Maine's most vulnerable community members to age in place and ensures that property taxes are still delivered to municipalities, requiring repayment of the loan once the property is sold or becomes part of an estate. 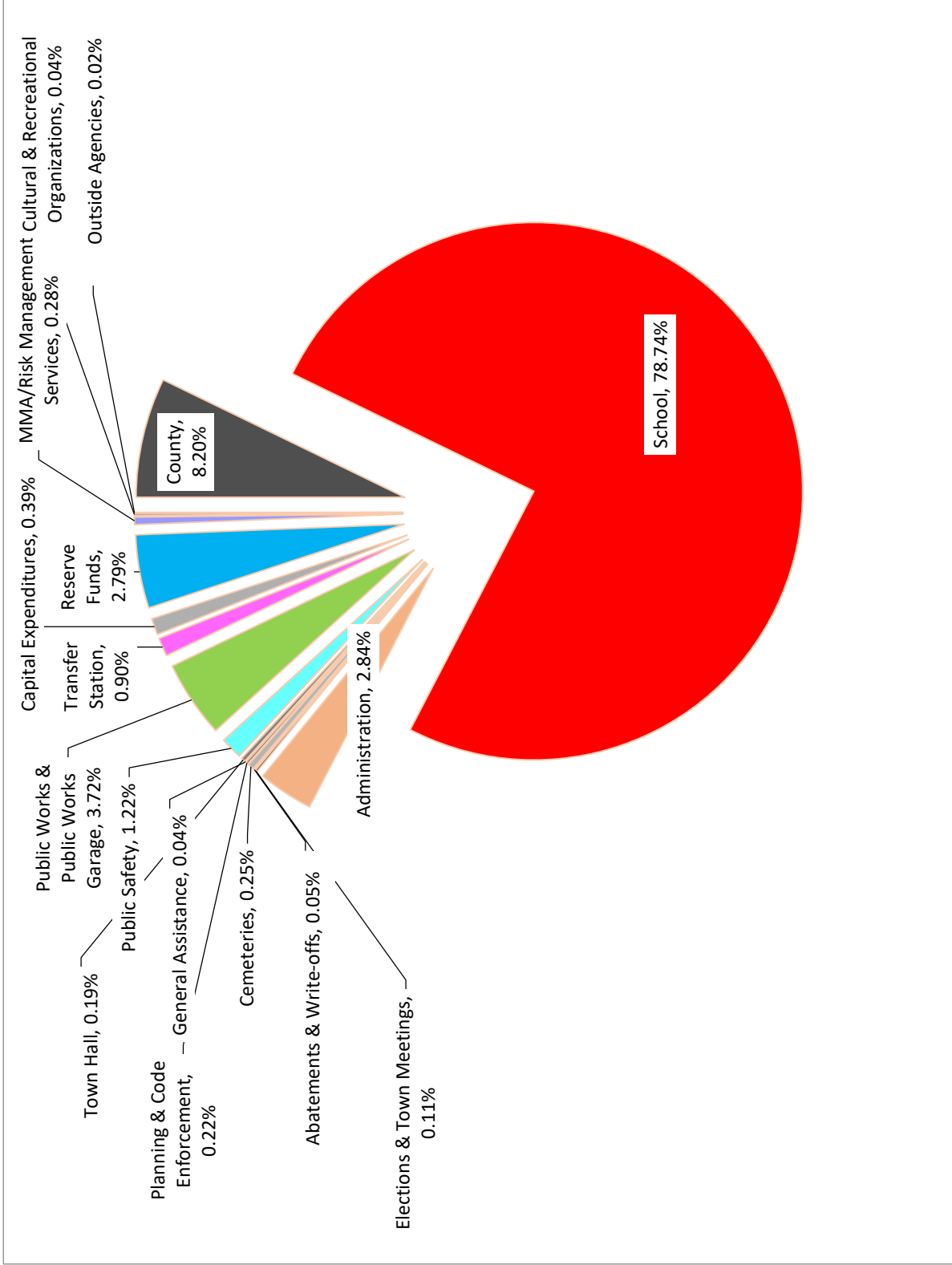

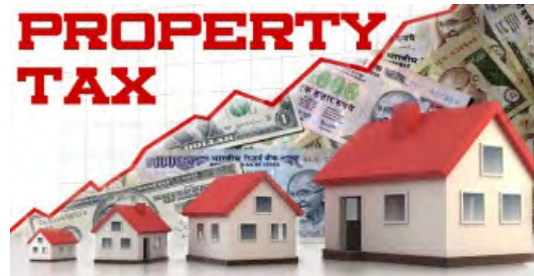

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share an update on issues important to Maine and America.

One of my priorities for 2023 has been to improve the appropriations process in Congress – the way it decides how to spend taxpayer money. I took over as the Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee last year. Along with Chair Patty Murray, we decided the best change we could make was not to do something new. Instead, it was to do something old – that is, go back to the regular and transparent committee process that we used to have.

Part of restoring this process included holding 50 public Committee hearings, which allowed for input from senators on both sides of the aisle. As a result, for the first time in five years, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed all twelve of its funding bills on time. This was done with strong bipartisan support. In fact, seven of them passed unanimously.

Now, we need to work with the House of Representatives to pass these twelve bills and turn them into laws.

These bills contain funding for a wide range of Maine priorities, including support for the workforce at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, our lobster industry, infrastructure improvements, affordable housing, biomedical research, veterans, and heating assistance programs like LIHEAP. These bills also contain nearly \$590 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for 231 projects throughout the State of Maine. These projects would help promote job creation, expand access to health care, and improve public safety, infrastructure, and important resources in communities across all 16 counties of our state. I will continue to work to get these bills signed into law in the new year.

On October 25, the horrific mass shooting in Lewiston claimed the lives of 18 Mainers and injured 13 others. In response, I led Maine's Congressional Delegation in requesting an independent investigation by the U.S. Army Inspector General into the events leading up to the shooting. On December 15, the Under Secretary of the Army wrote to inform me that such an investigation will take place, and the Army Inspector General has instructed her team to immediately begin preparing to conduct this investigation. While nothing can undo the events of October 25, I will continue to work to understand what happened and what could have been done differently, and to find answers for the victims, survivors, and their families.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,855th consecutive roll call vote.

As we look ahead to 2024, I remain committed to addressing the concerns of Maine families and communities. If you need assistance or wish to share your thoughts, please do not hesitate to reach out to one of my six state offices.



The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2023. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Correctional Services, Civil Process, Administrative and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and Drug and a School Resource Officer for MSAD 49 and RSU#38.

In 2023, Law Enforcement Deputies again logged thousands of calls for service. Our calls for service have increased since 2021. Our geographic patrol responsibilities within the County have increased, as the state police have opted to reduce their rural patrol coverage.

Overdoses of illicit substances continue to plague our county. My staff responded to 18 overdoses in 2023, we were able to save 11 of those lives. This number does not include the saves by jail staff in 2022. As the disorder continues to increase, I wish to make it clear that we at the Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

The patrol division welcomes Scott Dumas, Riley Boivin and Simon Yorks to our patrol team. This is the only law enforcement agency Deputy Boivin has ever worked for and is doing an excellent job. He will be attending the full-time academy in the spring of 2024. Deputies Dumas and Yorks came to us from other agencies and they both have many years of experience. Great additions to our team of professionals.

My agency continues to receive federal funds to conduct patrol details specifically related to motor vehicle violations throughout our county. Kennebec County Deputies continue to excel statistically for the number of interdictions for drug related criminal activities. In 2023 the deputies seized over 6 pounds of fentanyl in several different contacts with individuals distributing this poison. There we also seizures of methamphetamines as well as cocaine.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2023, the three civil deputies received over 5,111 requests for service in Kennebec County. This is a decrease from 2022 of documents received. Some of the services include civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

We welcome any questions regarding civil service to be made to the office. Kennebec is very lucky to have Chief Civil Deputy Harry McKenney, who just happens to be the go-to guy on civil service matters statewide.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 2206 inmate intakes. This is an increase from 2022. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Trespass to Homicide. Our staffing at the correctional facility is robust and we are doing well. I will add that the staff have enormous responsibilities and work hard every day.

Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. We have improved our medical and mental health services at Kennebec to help manage the needs of those incarcerated. Medical Assisted Treatment for Opiate dependencies continues in our facility, as it is now required by law.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. During the winter months, the outside trustees shovel several driveways in the Augusta area for those who are aging and unable to do it themselves. One may think that this only benefits the county, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well. It allows them to be productive in our communities.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment, and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

In May of 2023 we moved into our new office located at 73 Winthrop Street in Augusta. What a breath of fresh air for the staff. Please feel free to stop in and see our new Sheriff's Office.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2024, I remain committed to serving the hard-working taxpayers of this county, their families, and our visitors, honorably, professionally, and by using good common sense and judgement.

Recognizing the evolving demands of the future workforce, Erskine Academy's academic program is crafted to empower our students with the skills necessary for success in an ever-changing world. Whether they aspire to be future professional tradespeople, medical professionals, engineers, or laborers, we are committed to equipping them with the knowledge, adaptability, and innovative mindset essential for success within their chosen paths.

Equally necessary, fostering a sense of stewardship towards the local community and the world is integral to Erskine Academy's mission. Through instilling a deep sense of understanding and concern toward others, our graduates are taught the impact of conscientious and dependable citizenship. Erskine Academy's various initiatives and service-oriented programs inspire our students to become compassionate leaders who understand the importance of empathy, kindness, and goodwill to others.


As noted last year by retired Headmaster Michael McQuarrie, our school accrediting agency, *The New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)*, affirmed our educational program's commitment to the students within the Sheepscot Valley through their response to our most recent Five-Year Interim Report: "...the Commission wishes to note the level of attention which the school gives its students. You have developed a truly extensive and effective program—one that is singularly focused on students maximizing their experience and on the post-secondary experiences available to them."

A snapshot of Erskine Academy's 2022-2023 educational program includes:

- Erskine Academy is approved for state tuition through the Maine Department of Education (MDOE) and accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). The thorough accreditation process occurs every ten years, with Erskine Academy's decennial visits beginning in the spring of 2025.
- Enrollment of **557** students in grades nine through twelve from 16 local towns.
- **33%** of Erskine Academy students qualify for **reduced or free lunch**.
- A **12:1 student-to-teacher ratio**
- A **99% graduation rate**
- Of 123 graduates in 2023, **100% graduated with a viable and accessible post-secondary plan**. Plans included higher or continuing education in 4 and 2-year programs, many to highly selective colleges and universities (81%); apprenticeships with local companies (17%), and military service (2%).
- Erskine Academy offered **85 total courses** in the 2022-2023 academic year.
- Erskine Academy offered **9 Advanced Placement (AP) courses** that enrolled **124** students.

- **68 students (29%)** attended the **Capital Area Technical Center (CATC)**, gaining knowledge in the skilled trades and earning certificates toward competency.
- Erskine Academy has a plethora of student activities and clubs. With **32 athletic teams** over three seasons and **23 clubs and activities** available, **ALL** students find themselves involved and part of Erskine Academy's vibrant student life.

I offer my sincerest gratitude to the residents of Windsor for upholding the valuable opportunity of high school choice for your youth and families—a privilege coveted by many and accessible to only approximately 3% of Maine students. We cherish the value of school choice and never take for granted the responsibility parents place upon us by choosing Erskine Academy for their child's high school placement. Families who have selected Erskine Academy have put their trust in our school's faculty and staff, allowing us to play a pivotal role in fostering their child's intellectual, social, and personal growth. Windsor's continued support of school choice and Erskine Academy enables us to ensure that the students of Windsor are fully prepared for success as workers and citizens, a responsibility we take ownership of daily. Once again, thank you for your unwavering support and belief in Erskine Academy.



Looking ahead to the 2024-2025 academic year, RSU 12 is finalizing its school budget with citizen input. The proposed budget is \$27,234,496.98, a 3.1% increase due to new state-mandated unfunded legislation, inflation, energy costs, and a 6% rise in the state-set high school tuition rate. Despite these fiscal challenges imposed upon the district, the Board is committed to a fiscally responsible budget that supports students and maintains school choice options. In conclusion, we take great pride in the progress achieved within RSU 12 and look forward to continued collaboration with the Windsor community to provide inspiring educational opportunities for our students. GREETINGS:

In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, qualified by law to vote in Windsor affairs, to meet at the **WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL**, in said Town of Windsor on **TUESDAY**, the **ELEVENTH** day of **JUNE, 2024** A.D. at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then and there to act on Article 1, Articles 2 and Article 3 are going to be voted upon at the polls by secret ballot. **The Polls shall be opened at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots will be processed at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.**

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the **WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL** in said Town of Windsor on **WEDNESDAY** the **TWELFTH** day of **JUNE 2024** A.D. at 6:30 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 4 through 41 will be voted on at the open Town Meeting.

All articles being set out below to wit:

ARTICLE 1. ELECTION OF MODERATOR: To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICIALS: To elect all necessary Town of Windsor Officers/Officials by Secret Ballot.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to transfer up to \$23,365.00 from the Unassigned Fund Balance to purchase and install an Electronic LED Message Sign at the Windsor Volunteer Fire Department by Secret Ballot.

- C. The Town will treat all overpayment of taxes as prepayments on next year's taxes pursuant to 36 MRSA §506 and shall pay no interest on such payments.

- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 3.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. Charge interest at the rate of 7.0 % per annum on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2025.

- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

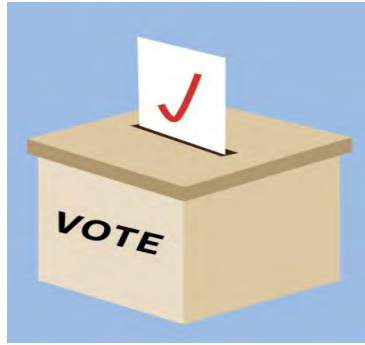
RSU #12 WINDSOR CANDIDATE
