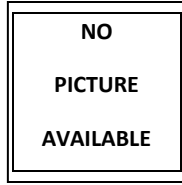

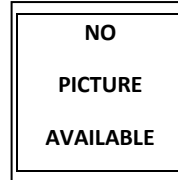

In the past year we have done Major Road Construction on the following roads per Town approval:

1. Paving on Coopers Mills Road and Maxcy's Mill Road.
2. Paint work on Barton Road, Reed Road, Hunts Meadow Road, Melaney Road, Sampson Road, Greeley Road, and Windsor Neck Road.
3. Crack sealing on Griffin Road and Choate Road.
4. Gravel work on Weeks Mills Road, Tyler Road, and Reed Road.

We've had some exciting changes to our Public Works Department this past year with Keith Hall being promoted to our Road Commissioner and the addition of Derek Bartlett to our Team. A huge thank you to our public works team for their hard work this past winter plowing! Public Works staff members worked many back-to-back weekends to ensure Windsor Roads were safe to travel for our residents during inclement weather. Their time and dedication shined through in the results from their hard work.

This upcoming 2026/2027 year we will be overlaying the Weeks Mills Road from the Augusta intersection and re-paving the Windsor Volunteer Fire Department's Parking Lot.

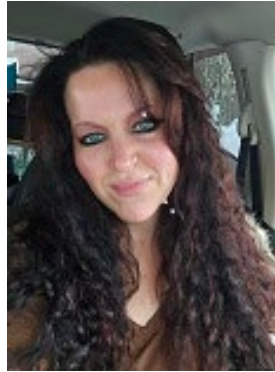

Town Clerk's Report

Dear Residents of Windsor,

I am honored to serve as Town Clerk and appreciate the warm welcome. I look forward to working with everyone to support our community!

The municipal clerk's office primary responsibilities include the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from September 1995, death records beginning in 2011, and marriage records beginning January 1, 2017, are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License.....	\$40.00
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....	\$15.00
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....	\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the Clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course to purchase a Hunting license.

There were **608** dogs registered, and 2 kennel licenses issued in 2025. Dogs 6 months or older that reside in Windsor for longer than 10 days. must be registered annually by December 31st.

You must have a current rabies certificate to license your dog. You will also need to provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. We now offer on-line dog licensing, through the state's website at www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl Please be aware that you must be able to submit your current rabies vaccination to us if requested when using the on-line licensing. Per state law, a \$25 late fee applies to any dog registration as of February 1st.

Please visit our website www.windsor.maine.gov for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, tax maps, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not currently accept payment online nor by phone.

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. In order to vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a Driver's License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address. If you are planning to be out of town on Election Day, you may request an absentee ballot. The request must be made at least three business days prior to voting day unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 60 days prior to an election.

Our polling place has been changed back to Windsor Town Hall, 523 Ridge Road, Windsor ME.

Currently there are 1,877 Registered Voters in Windsor. There are 369 Democrat, 807 Republican, 90 Green Independent, 16 Libertarian and 595 Unenrolled voters.

Whether you were a moderator, warden, ballot clerk, election clerk, deputy registrar, or even simply someone helping set up booths, I really appreciate all you have done and are willing to do to help make our elections run as smoothly as possible. Thank you!

This year the Animal Control Officer's handled 243 animal issues for the Town of Windsor, which included the following:

It is the ***LAW** to license your dog/s **every** year!

* The \$25 late fee for dog licenses applied after January 31st is imposed by the State statute, and nothing in the law vests any discretion in a municipal clerk or any other official to waive this fee (*see 7 M.R.S.A. § 3923-A(4)*) The late fee is in addition to the annual license fee before any license applied for after January 31st can be issued.

PLEASE NOTE:

You are responsible for obtaining a license within 10 days after:

- Your dog reaches the age of 6 months.
- You become the owner or keeper of a dog aged 6 months or more.
- You move to a new community. (License transfer fee is \$1.00)

*** Proper ID can prevent your dog from going to the shelter – please keep your dog tags on their collars!**

Tags are available after October 15th and **must** be purchased **by** December 31st.

As stated, before we continue to keep our EMS level updated with our monthly continuing education classes; our equipment continues to be keep updated and kept to top of the line as we can, with a continued knowledge base of all our equipment.

We have added an Automated Chest Compressor unit this year that will help during sudden death situation and will allow us to give more effective CPR, this unit is in excess of \$ 22,000 dollars.

2026 ASSESSORS' REPORT

The Assessor's Office is committed to providing the taxpayers of Windsor with fair and equitable valuations of real and personal property for taxation purposes. This is accomplished through professional standards and the consistent application of reliable procedures in accordance with Maine State Law.

Most records maintained by the Assessor's Office are available for public review, including the tax commitment book, tax maps, property record cards, and real estate transfer tax declarations.

The Town of Windsor operates on a fiscal year from July 1 through June 30. Property assessments are fixed as of April 1 each year.

2025 Tax Commitment statistics:

- The certified ratio: 100%
- Total taxable valuation of real estate and personal property: \$576,245,680
- The 2025-2026 total tax levy: \$5,516,709.39
- Tax rate: \$9.40 per thousand dollars of value

Exemption Statistics:

- 703 taxpayers qualified for the Homestead Exemption saving \$235 per household.
- 81 taxpayers qualified for Veteran's Exemption saving \$56.40 per veteran.
- 4 taxpayers qualified for the Blind Exemption saving \$37.60 per individual.
- 8 businesses qualified for the Business Equipment Tax Exemption with a total tax reduction of \$9,539.10

To qualify for these exemptions, applicants must meet the eligibility requirements outlined in each program and submit the appropriate application to the Assessor's Office by April 1. Current Land Use Programs:

These programs allow land to be assessed based on its current use rather than its potential fair market value. Windsor currently has the following acreage enrolled:

- Open Space: 48 acres valued at \$36,000
- Farmland: 2,139.48 acres valued at \$268,250

Windsor Food Bank is dedicated to ensuring no one in our community goes hungry. Our group is completely volunteer and through our programs we help families fighting with food insecurity.

In the last several years the increase in need has grown exponentially. In 2024 we provided 24,944 meals to families in need. Last year, 2025 we provided 53,193 meals to our neighbors. Right now, in 2026, we are on track to exceed 2025 numbers by at least double again.

With the price of food continuing to increase we foresee a bigger struggle for families to afford their basic needs. This burden on families has put us in a unique position to help.

Last year in April we saw an average of 20-25 families visiting our food bank. April 1, 2026 we had 57 families attend, including 5 new families just that day alone. The increase in attendance has grown greatly in recent months and economic hardship has become a reality for many.

In 2026 we have been able to partner once again with Good Shepherd Food Bank, Augusta Food Bank, Winslow Community Cupboard, and Field of Greens to provide our community with fresh produce, breads and meats. Working together has allowed us to help our neighbors through these trying times.

We would like to thank our community for supporting our efforts and will continue to aid those in need.

The Windsor Historical Society could not prosper without our volunteers and the donations we receive. We thank everyone who has donated time, artifacts and/or money, no matter how little or great that donation might be. However, our membership is aging, and we look to you, the residents of Windsor and surrounding towns, to spread the word to those who might be interested in joining our Society. We feel that the Windsor Historical Society is a leader in bridging the past with the future and with your help, we will continue to grow. Our greatest achievement is to educate students about the history of Windsor.

Our monthly meetings are the second Wednesday of the month, April through November; held in the Malta Room on the fairgrounds, and all are welcome to attend. We encourage you to join should you have an interest in local history.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine, and I welcome this opportunity to update you on the work that has taken place in the Senate over the past year. My staff and I have addressed numerous issues affecting our state, and I would like to share some of the progress that we have made.

Since my *Social Security Fairness Act* was signed into law in January 2025, the law has been fully implemented and restored earned retirement benefits to 2.8 million Americans. More than 25,000 Mainers have seen their monthly benefits increase and have been issued more than \$184.5 million in retroactive payments. I am proud that this legislation has improved the lives of many retired firefighters, teachers, police officers, and other public employees and their spouses.

I was honored to become the first Maine Senator in nearly a century to lead the Appropriations Committee. Since I took this role last January, Congress enacted full-year appropriations bills before December for the first time since 2018. These bipartisan bills included full-year funding for Military Construction and the Department of Veterans Affairs, the US Department of Agriculture, and the Food and Drug Administration. At my request, these bills included nearly \$35 million in Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) for local projects across Maine that will improve fire stations and emergency services, update municipal buildings, and support upgraded facilities at the Maine National Guard and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard (PNSY) in Kittery. This funding builds on the nearly \$1.1 billion in CDS I have secured since 2021 for worthy projects that benefit local communities and nonprofits across our state's 16 counties. As Chair, I remain committed to working to better ensure that federal spending and investments produce real results for the people of Maine.


I have also led other important legislative efforts this year that address problems many Mainers face. This includes bills that expand federal efforts to combat Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses and improve access to early testing for Alzheimer's disease. Provisions I authored to strengthen prevention, treatment, and recovery services for those struggling with substance use disorders and mental illness were included in the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Reauthorization Act* that was recently signed into law. An amendment I authored in this year's *National Defense Authorization Act* will increase apprenticeship opportunities at public shipyards like PNSY. That bill also includes more than \$400 million to support critical infrastructure improvements at PNSY and a well-deserved 3.8 percent pay raise for all our nation's service members.

In addition to advancing legislation, I worked to ensure that federal commitments to Maine were maintained and, when necessary, restored. I secured a seasonal employee exemption for Acadia National Park from the Administration's federal hiring freeze and from closure during the recent government shutdown. I protected local programs like Maine Sea Grant and global initiatives like the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) from harmful funding cuts. I led the effort to resume enrollment at Maine Job Corps centers and fought for full funding for Maine's public schools this school year. I preserved funding for the University of Maine System and secured the restoration of funding to the Passamaquoddy Tribe at Pleasant Point and the Penobscot Nation. I protected low-income Mainers' access to key programs like LIHEAP and SNAP. Although I voted against the *One Big Beautiful Bill Act* due to my opposition to Medicaid cuts, I helped secure \$50 billion to support rural health providers through the legislation's Rural Health Transformation Program. Maine has been awarded \$190 million in the first year of this five-year grant program.

Throughout my Senate service, I have never missed a roll-call vote and have cast more than 9,850 consecutive votes—reflecting the Maine work ethic I bring to Washington. My continued ranking as most bipartisan Senator from the Lugar Center and Georgetown University is a testament to Maine's tradition of working with cooperation and respect.



The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the professional services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2025. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections Services, Civil Process, Court and Transport Division. We will always provide regional assets to our communities including a K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy and Accident Reconstruction.

As in previous years our Law Enforcement Deputies logged thousands of calls for service.

One call for service continues to decrease and that service is overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances. I personally believe the increase in treatment options, both locally and nationally, has had an impact on overdose deaths. This Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

In 2025 our patrol division welcomed Deputy Chad Webster, Deputy Tyler Johnson, Deputy Max Sawyer and Deputy Nicholas Gage to our team. Currently 3 out of the four mentioned individuals are fully certified law enforcement officers.

In 2025 the Sheriff's Office continued our School Resource Officer duties for MSAD #11 in Gardiner, MSAD #49 Albion, Benton, Clinton and Fairfield and RSU#38 at Maranacook. We have had requests from other communities for a School Resource Officer and should we be able to get to full staff, we will try and fulfill these requests.

In 2025 Detective Devin Polizzotti received eight weeks of specialized training, downloading digital information off phones, laptops and desktops, assisting with retrieving evidence for criminal cases. Our detective is one of only about 15 people in the state with the ability to do this. Our agency also received over \$70,000.00 in specialized hardware at no cost.

We had two retirements in 2025. Staff Sergeant Frank Hatch retired and then rehired as our Patrol Commander. K-9 Vixen, who has served our communities with great distinction and tenacity for several years, is now living the dream of relaxation with her handler Deputy Jeff Boudreau. Her amazing ability to locate people, drugs and other articles associated with crimes, is noteworthy. Maybe Deputy Beaudreau had a little bit to do with it as well.

Deputy Beaudreau reached out to a couple nonprofits and was able to secure monies to purchase not one but two new K-9s, saving the hard-working taxpayers of this county thousands of dollars. Deputy Boudreau's new partner is Rooster, a male Dutch Shepherd and the other is Rico, a Belgian Malinois teamed up with Deputy Curtis as his handler.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2025, the three civil deputies received over 5,130 requests for service in Kennebec County. This has been an increase by over 500 services from 2024. Some of the services include civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.


During the past year, our Correctional Facility had 1984 inmate intakes into the facility. The offenses committed by those in our care included everything from Trespass to Homicide. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of inmates with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. Kennebec and all other county jails are mandated by state law to provide these services. On a side note, our correctional facility received a 100% compliance during our Department of Corrections inspection. A job well done by all!

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the County, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well. They are very hard workers, and they make a difference. Thank you to programs inmate supervisor John Matthews, for his dedication to his job.

I again would like to thank all my staff in administration, patrol division, detective division, correctional division and the civil deputies. About 112 of them in total, for their dedicated service to our county.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2026, my focus will remain constant and focused, serving the people of this county and our visitors honorably, professionally through good common sense and good judgement law enforcement.

Our support to the town of Windsor includes continuing medical/rescue education, on-scene replacement of medical supplies used on the call, oxygen refilling for first responders, and standby coverage for the Windsor Fair.

Delta Ambulance is committed to providing the highest quality emergency medical services to the communities we serve - safely and effectively. This is Delta’s number one priority, and we are prepared and proud to serve you as your trusted emergency medical service provider. Our Paramedics exceed State Standards for recertification and respond with the latest medical technology available including 12 lead EKG and pharmaceutical interventions. Our care is reviewed in our Continuing Quality Improvement (CQI) program, which is recognized as a leading process in Maine.

Changes in the ambulance transport industry over the last few years have resulted in higher net losses for services nationwide, especially in rural areas. Delta has addressed this financial gap in part by incrementally increasing service rates for partner communities since 2023, backed by a commitment to full operational transparency amid widespread economic challenges. We are confident that local communities benefit from Delta's regional model, which balances resources and centralizes call volume to deliver a far more cost-effective service than any local alternative.

Dear Residents of Windsor,

Erskine Academy is grateful for the continued trust and partnership of the Town of Windsor. As we progress through our 142nd year of service, we remain committed to providing Windsor students with a rigorous, supportive, and future-focused high school experience grounded in strong community values and meaningful educational opportunity. This report is intended to share how Erskine Academy is serving Windsor students and honoring public investment in their education.

Erskine Academy currently enrolls **528 students in grades nine through twelve**, including **88 students from Windsor**, consistent with recent years. Our role as an independent town academy of choice remains central to our mission, and we take seriously our responsibility to serve students, families, and sending towns with care, transparency, and accountability.

Academic Program and Student Outcomes

Erskine Academy delivers strong academic outcomes across a wide range of postsecondary pathways. The school maintains a **99% graduation rate**, well above the state average, and all graduates leave with a viable postsecondary plan including four- and two-year colleges, technical and trade programs, apprenticeships, military service, and workforce entry.

A hallmark of the Erskine experience is access to **college-level coursework while still in high school**. In 2024–2025, students engaged in **455 opportunities to earn college credit** through Advanced Placement (AP) courses and dual enrollment partnerships. Of those opportunities, **407 (90%)** were successfully completed, resulting in college credit issued to students. Based on current University of Maine tuition rates, these credits represent an estimated **\$517,704 in avoided tuition costs** for Erskine families—an important economic benefit for sending towns and taxpayers.

Specifically, **49 students completed 78 AP examinations**, with **92% earning qualifying scores**. Additionally, **377 students participated in dual enrollment courses** with institutions including Kennebec Valley Community College, Thomas College, and UMaine Farmington, with **91% earning college credit**. Many graduates who pursue higher education do so having already completed at least one semester of college coursework.

Experiential Learning

Erskine Academy continues to expand career-connected learning opportunities aligned with current workforce needs. In 2024–2025, **56 students** attended the **Capital Area Technical Center (CATC)**, earning industry-recognized certifications, and **16 students** completed **Extended Learning Opportunities (ELOs)**, engaging in internships and applied learning experiences that build professional skills and community connections.

These career-connected experiences ensure that Erskine Academy graduates are prepared not only for college, but for immediate entry into Maine’s workforce with practical skills, certifications, and professional experience aligned with regional employment needs.

Faculty, Climate, and Accreditation

Erskine Academy benefits from a stable and experienced faculty, with low turnover contributing to strong relationships and a positive school climate. The school has been recognized as one of the **Best Places to Work in Maine** for two consecutive years.

Through the **New England Association of Schools and Colleges** (NEASC) accreditation process, Erskine Academy is affirmed as a school with a strong foundation of educational excellence and a consistently safe, welcoming, and well-ordered learning environment. The recent self-study and external independent review of the school demonstrated clear alignment among the school’s mission, instructional practices, and student outcomes. NEASC commended Erskine’s rigorous academic program, effective governance, and dedicated faculty, and highlighted a culture of mutual respect and meaningful student engagement. Recent educational enhancements include the **Innovation Center**, expanded shop technology offerings, and continued implementation of the **Portrait of a Graduate**, emphasizing problem-solving, integrity, civility, collaboration, and academic mastery.


Facilities and Stewardship


Our extracurricular programs had a remarkable year. Both the boys' and girls' soccer teams reached the Sheepscoot Valley Championships this fall, and the girls' varsity team won back-to-back titles. On the court, the boys' varsity basketball team captured the championship as well. These accomplishments reflect the well-rounded educational experience we aim to provide.


We would also like to recognize three longtime Windsor staff members, Mary Clark, Jane King, and Gary Clark, who will retire at the end of this school year. Their years of service have shaped the lives of countless children, and their impact will be felt for many years to come.

Early learning opportunities remain available to Windsor families. Full-day Pre-Kindergarten is offered to Windsor residents at Somerville Elementary School, providing a strong foundation for our youngest learners. The program includes transportation and supports a smooth transition into elementary school. Registration for Pre-K has begun, and we encourage families to take advantage of this valuable opportunity.

Budget and June 9 Referendum: The most important date for Windsor residents this spring is Tuesday, June 9, when the school budget referendum will be held at the Windsor Town Office. We strongly encourage every resident to vote. The proposed RSU 12 budget for the upcoming year represents a total 4.2% increase over last year's local budget. This increase reflects real pressures the district is working to manage responsibly, including rising tuition costs for both regular and special education at the high school level, and required capital contributions to the private secondary schools that serve our students. (As RSU 12 does not operate its own high school, the district pays tuition and contributes to the schools our students attend.) Community input has played an important role in shaping this budget. The budget proposal was unanimously approved by the RSU 12 Board of Directors and received unanimous support at the district budget meeting held on May 20 at Chelsea Elementary School. It is now in the hands of voters for final approval. Thank you for your ongoing partnership as we work together to ensure a bright future for our students. Through collaboration and shared dedication, we will continue to serve Windsor students effectively and plan responsibly for the years ahead.

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the **WINDSOR TOWN HALL** in said Town of Windsor on **WEDNESDAY** the **TENTH** day of **JUNE 2026** A.D. at 6:00 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 4 through 37 to be voted on at the open Town Meeting for FY 2027.

- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 3.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. The Town will charge interest at the rate of 7.0% per annum on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2027.

- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

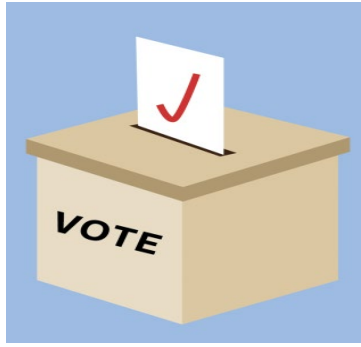
Budget Committee Member 3-year term
